Farmington Teacher Attends Band Clinic

Lloyd Smith, instrumental music teacher in the Farmington Public Schools, brought back new techniques in the teaching of flute to Farmington from a national band clinic he attended in Chicago recently.

The event was the 19th Annual Midwest Band Clinic, December 14, through 18, attended by some 5,000 band and orchestra directors from the United States, Canada, Germany and Japan. Smith, who has taught music in the Farmington schools since 1944, was the only Farmington educator attending. It was his first national clinic.

Highlights, he said, were the flute clinic sessions under Professor Robert Cole of the University of Wisconsin. Cole presented new approaches to embouchure, the shaping of the tongue and cheek muscles, to the instrument.

Marching band demonstrations, the appearance and standing ovation given the Cash Tech Band and professional chats with eminent music people made the experience memorable to Smith. He reported the event in detail to other Farmington music educators January 10.

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT: PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid School District will be held in the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, on Monday, January 17, 1966.

OPERATING MILLAGE INCREASE PROPOSITION: As a renewal of an operating millage increase heretofore approved by the electorate, which expires after the 1965 levy, the limit on the total amount of the millage which may be assessed against all real and tangible personal property in the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, for all purposes, as authorized by Section 6, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Michigan, Seven (7) Mills (7/10 of 1%) of the assessed valuation, as finally equalized, of all such property in said School District for a period of ten (10) years, from 1965 to 1974, inclusive, to be used only for the purpose of paying general operating expenses of said School District.

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time. The places of voting shall be as follows: Precinct 1: Clarenceville Junior High School, 20210 Middlebelt Road, Livonia, Michigan.

Precinct 2: Clarenceville Senior High School, 20155 Middlebelt Road, Livonia, Michigan. Each person voting on the proposition for increasing the millage must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of twenty-one (21) years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months, and in the School District thirty (30) days preceding the day of election and must be a registered elector of the School District in addition to the above qualifications, each person voting on the proposition for increasing the millage must be the owner of property assessed for ad valorem taxes within the School District or the lawful husband or wife of such person.

Only registered voters are eligible to vote. STATEMENT AS TO PREVIOUSLY VOTED: I, Lloyd M.
