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The War on Poverty was described as a self-help program aimed at taking people off the welfare rolls and placing them into productive jobs at last week's meeting of the Farmington Democratic Club.

The workings of the Economic Opportunity program in Oakland County and the Farmington area was discussed at the meeting by Dr. Edward McIrvine and Luther Flanagan. Mrs. Richard Rutter described the Head Start program sponsored last summer by the Farmington School system.

DR. McIRVINE is a member of the Oakland County Economic Opportunity Committee. He emphasized that the program is not welfare but an attempt to give individuals the training they need to become a productive part of society.

Dr. McIrvine said the program involves several aspects of breaking the poverty cycle including job training, keeping students in schools, aid to small business and residents of rural areas. He had high praise for the Head Start program which gives pre-school training to children from economically deprived areas. Dr. McIrvine said the younger you set a person into the program the less money you have to spend on them. FLANAGAN, assistant direc-

tor of Oakland County's community action center. He said the whole key to the program is "that a person must do something to gain any benefits. It's not a giveaway program." He stressed that the program is geared to working with existing public and private agencies.

"We must have all kinds of programs to break the cycle of poverty," Flanagan declared. He said that in addition to the self help programs the community action centers will try to bring to the poor the services they need.

Flanagan said that the Farmington area has more than 250 families earning less than \$3,000 a year and therefore eligible for the Economic Opportunity program.

MRS. RUTTER had praise for the Farmington Head Start program last summer. She had 24 children in the program held at William Grace School. She said that children in the two to five age group learn more than at any other period in their lives. She said a major emphasis in the program is to get the children from the economically deprived homes to know their worth and their ability to contribute to society. The Farmington Public School system has applied for two class rooms for the Head Start program next summer.

The Farmington School system has a Lincoln Scholar in its midst. It is Weldon Petz, principal of Bond Elementary School, who will bring his knowledge and experience to Cloverdale School for a Jan. 24 PTA meeting at 7:30 p.m.

Lincolniana is not only a hobby with Mr. Petz but was also the subject of research and study leading to the writing of his Master's thesis "Music and Abraham Lincoln."

Petz received his Master of Arts Degree from Wayne State University. Through his study he has worked with such men as Carl Sandburg, served on advisory boards, historical societies and has written published book reviews. He has also completed programs for Educational TV on various phases of Lincoln's life.

The popularity of Petz as a speaker on the subject of Lincoln is evident in the fact that he has spoken to over 300 groups (school and civic) over the past 10 years.
