1966 Girl Scout Cookie Sale To be Staged Jan. 28 to Feb. 6

It's that time of year when Girl Scouts from the Southern Oakland Council will be ringing your doorbell for your Cookie Order.

Girls from Troops 73, 386, and 11 of the Ward Eagle Elementary School (Fourteen Mile and Middlebelt Roads) will be taking orders from January 28 through February 6. Delivery will be made March 9-16.

Five varieties of cookies are being offered this year including Mints, peanut butter sandwich, chocolate and vanilla sandwich, butter-flavored shorties, and sugar 'n' spice wafers.

PROFITS from the cookie sale are used primarily to support the Girl Scout camping program in which a large percentage of Scouts participate through summer resident camping and day camping or year-round troop camping.

Camp Nardin, the Council's resident camp near Clarkston, was able to add a new dining hall, new and larger infirmary, and an all-camp shower building with profits from last year's cookie sale.

YM Traces Growth

The Farmington YMCA is in full operation. Since its inception in 1953 the local Y has had rapid growth in service to the community.

Beginning as an extension program of the YMCA of Metropolitan Detroit, the Y provided the initial direction setting for the development of this local Y. In June of 1964 the Farmington Area Extension officially became the 14th branch of the Detroit YMCA. With a Board of Management composed of 24 men and women, two full time YMCA professionals, 11 staff members, and the use of a farm house on Grand River near Drake Road.

At the end of 1965 attendance figures for major YMCA groups are as follows: F.A.T.A.C., 5,475 teenagers; Indian Guides, 4,435 fathers and sons; Swimming, 3,034 boys and girls; Adult Classes, 1,570 men and women; Board and Committees, 993 men and women; Day Camp, 1,314 boys and girls; Sex Education, 480 family members; Total YMCA Services to members and the community, 38,634 and total YMCA membership, 1,552 Men, Women, boys and girls. The last week of January has been designated as National YMCA Week across the country and will be recognized locally as follows: On Sunday, January 23 and January 30 several churches in the Farmington area will be utilizing over 4,500 YMCA Sunday Bulletins or inserts. These have been provided to the churches with the compliments of the Farmington Area Y. This is the second year that YMCA Sunday will be celebrated in the local churches.

During this YMCA Week in 1966 we are particularly mindful of their important role. It was over 120 years ago that the movement was founded in London, England by George Williams, a young dry goods clerk. "I believe," he said, "that if earnest, devoted, and self-denying men can unite themselves together, God would smile upon their efforts, and much good might be done."
