Big Fair To Benefit Little League

It's "Come to the Fair" on Saturday, February 5. Come to the Fair so the Little Leaguers of North Farmington-West Bloomfield can play a better game of baseball this summer. In just a few months it'll be "Play Ball" for the team members of the North Farmington-West Bloomfield Baseball for Boys.

But to "Play Ball" you've got to have a place to play—baseball diamonds, players' benches, dugouts, etc., and the Little Leaguers need three more this year.

WITH THE HOPE of financing the cost of at least one of these diamonds—roughly one thousand dollars—the Little Leaguers are holding a Carnival.

The Carnival is to be held at North Farmington High School (Thirteen Mile Road near Farmington Road) on Saturday, February 5th, from noon until 10 p.m.

It is open to all residents of the area, and their friends. There is no admission charge. Highlighting the many features of the Midway are Silhouettes to be done by Silbuettes (Mrs. Blaine) Ford, a local artist who resides in Farmington.

MRS. FORD is widely known both for the high caliber of her art and her devotion to volunteer causes.

Her first love is the voluntary art classes which she conducts for the emotionally disturbed children at Pontiac State Hospital.

Mrs. Ford has had one woman art exhibit composed primarily of portraits done in pastels, at the Wheaton Gallery.

Her work has also been on display at the Ford Auditorium, when she was commissioned to do portraits of the first chairmen of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Mrs. Ford has been doing Silhouettes at church and local fairs for the past ten years.

THESE SILHOUETTES are life-size; are done in black, and then mounted on white cardboard, suitable for framing.

The cost to Little League

As a manifestation of the many volunteer and unselfish good deeds which she has done in the past, Mrs. Ford has asked that 50 per cent of all funds collected from her Silhouettes done at the Carnival be given to North Farmington-West Bloomfield Baseball for Boys.

The remaining 50 per cent will be donated to the Cadet Troop: Girl Scouts, in which Mrs. Ford is very active, and for whom she acts as Art Consultant for their summer day camp.

Of the 20 "Games of Skill" on the Midway—all of them professionally directed—five are designed specifically for children, and modestly priced.

Another feature of the Little League Carnival is "Cake Walk"—the prizes being real home-made cakes, furnished by mothers of the Little Leaguers.

AN INNOVATION in this area, and the idea of Joe Kilmer, Little League Finance Chairman and Carnival Chairman, as well, is the opportunity offered other youth groups.

Girl and Boy Scouts, Cubes, Brownies, PTA, etc., to take booths at the Fair to display their creative efforts, explain the nature of their functions, or to participate in an activity

which would provide revenue for their own individual group. There will be a Little League Information Booth at the Carnival, staffed by officers and board members who will answer questions of parents of prospective Little Leaguers, pass out Little League literature, give information on registration for the new season, and provide the complete Little League schedule for the coming season.

So that no one goes hungry while trying his individual type of refreshments, including hot dogs, will be on hand for the buying.

IN CHARGE OF refreshments is Sally (Mrs. Bob) Gratton (Mr. Gratton is Little League Commissioner) assisted by Mrs. Steve Hockley, Mrs. Milton Weiss, Sr. and Mrs. Martin Lawrence.

Coordinating efforts for the "Cake Walk" is Jo (Mrs. Kenneth) Wright, Little League Secretary. Members of her committee are the Mesames Walter Byrdon, Lee Brooks, Paul Livingston, Kenneth Priestap, William Widman, Thomas Hendry, Charles Walby and Ted Kazanski.

In supervising the overall preparations for the Carnival, Mr. Kilmer has had the aid of

the members of the Finance Committee, who are: Doug Schenck, Jack Eckblad, Dick Illf, John McLean, Roger Schenck, Bill Gobeille, Bob Tighe, Len Cutler, Dick Tobin and Bud Boll.

In the words of commissioner Gratton, a resident of West Bloomfield, "When you find something you can do that's fun, and at the same time worthwhile, you've really found something. We hope everyone—not just the parents of Little Leaguers—in the North Farmington-West Bloomfield area will feel this way, too; and that they'll come to our Carnival, have a lot of fun themselves, and be helping our boys in their baseball program this summer."


