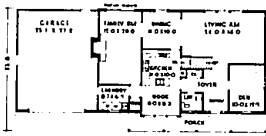
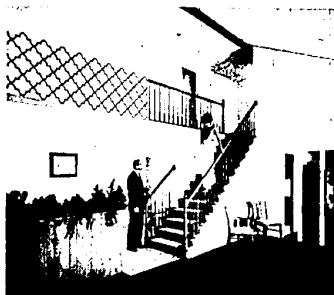

AAUW Adds 13 Institutions From Which Grads May Join

Mrs. Edge Cope, president of the Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women, has announced that the AAUW has added 13 institutions to its list of qualified colleges and universities, one located in Michigan: Aquinas College, Grand Rapids. The AAUW now lists 930 American colleges and universities whose women graduates are eligible for Association membership. In Michigan there are 780 AAUW members in 81 branches. All women who hold baccalaureate or higher degrees from any of these institutions may join the AAUW. The American Association of University Women was founded in 1882 to open the doors of education to women, and to unite alumnae of different institutions for "practical educational work." Today through its program AAUW enables members to continue their intellectual growth, to further the advancement of women, and to

discharge their special responsibility to society. THE FARMINGTON Branch extends an invitation to women graduates who wish to share in the many opportunities it offers for individual usefulness, as well as stimulus and congenial associates. Each member contributes to a program which gives focus to the influence of college women. Among their many projects, AAUW maintains a Fellowship Program which aids a gifted women scholars by providing over 100 graduate fellowships yearly, ranging from \$2500 to \$5000.

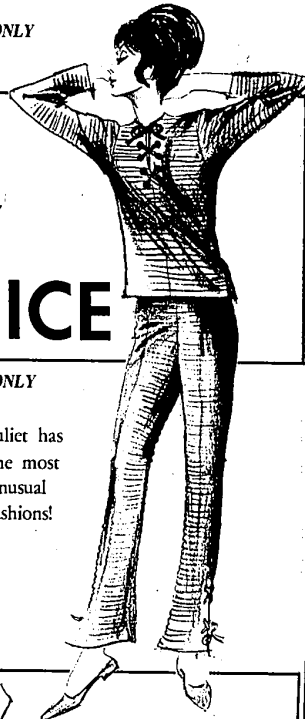
