Hunters Ridge Final Plat Is Approved

A final plat for Hunters Ridge apartment development was unanimously approved by the Township Planning Commission at a regular meeting on January 27.

Plans are for the first phase of construction of a luxury apartment complex to be located south of 14 Mile Road and west of Orchard Lake Road. When fully developed the 100 acre parcel will include 190 units renting from \$175 to \$500 a month; Hunters Ridge, the main support building with party facilities, billiard room, swimming pool, health club; hobby and crafts room, and service facilities; tennis and shuffleboard courts; and Hunters Square, a deluxe shopping center with double-faced specialty shops.

The development will have private roads with 24-hour guard service at the boulevard entrance on 14 Mile Road. The shopping center will be open to the general public.

One small parking change was recommended by planning consultants. Charles Leman and acceleration and deceleration traffic lanes were stipulated. A letter from the Farmington Board of Education asking for a tie-in to existing roads on the south was discussed. The proponent, Mel Rosenhaus, stated that since the development will be private roads, they will not connect; but that he will be happy to provide any walking easements for school children that the school board desires.

Request Tabled For Further Study

A request for rezoning of lots 3, 4, and 5 of Oakland Hills Orchard Subdivision on the east side of Orchard Lake Road from residential to business was tabled by the Township Planning Commission at their January 27 meeting.

The owners, Peter Kenny, William Lindall and Leon Serdynski, said they would like to sell their property but can't sell it as residential because of the commercial development across Orchard Lake Road.

The commission tabled the request pending a thorough study of the whole area. The study had already been planned by the commission.

Why No Lists

Dear Mr. Cairns:
On several occasions over the past months I have asked you for lists of newly-registered voters in Farmington Township. On each occasion you indicated to me that you would make such lists available to me in the next couple of days. I date I have not received a single name of the newly-registered voters in Farmington Township.

Last January I requested a list of the names of hundreds of Farmington Township residents who were being removed from the registration lists because they had not voted in the previous two years. I never received such a list, even though I pointed out that we wanted the names for use in an effort to keep as many as possible on the registration rolls.

Problem

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County Coordinating Committee, in his opinion, was "only advisory." He stated also that the adjoining municipalities should have been notified of the Committee's actions, but that the Village of Wood Creek Farms had received no notification.

BROWN SAID that the Committee had "stepped out of character" and, in his opinion, they went beyond their statutory powers in this zoning matter. He said that the decision on this is strictly a local matter.

James Giam, attorney for the proponents, stated that since both the Township Planning Commission and the Oakland County Coordinating Committee approved the rezoning, the commission should reconsider their decision.

Commission members, in setting the request for public hearing, made it clear that neither of the attorneys had influenced their decision. As one member put it, "in view of new thinking by another planning body, our Township Board has asked us to reconsider the request."

The hearing has been scheduled for Thursday, March 24.

Set Hearing on Haynes St. Lot

A public hearing was set for February 24, by the Township Planning Commission at their regular meeting of January 27, on the rezoning of lot 82 of Regal Granda.

The lot, owned by Bartlett Cady of Southfield, fronts on Haynes Street, between Nine Mile and Grand River. It has a cinder block building which it was used as commercial before zoning. It has been used as a factory and for sales by Padlock Pool. The owner has no definite intent to use for the lot. He wishes to rent it, but cannot do so until it is rezoned from single family residential to general business.

Consultant Leman recommended that the request be considered since the lot is not suited for residential use. The commission voted unanimously to set the request for public hearing.
