The building, highly contemporary in design, replaces temporary offices which the bank has occupied on this same site since July, 1957.

In announcing the opening of the new office, Charles H. Hewitt, president of Detroit Bank & Trust, commented: "This is the most recent in a series of new offices which Detroit Bank & Trust is constructing to serve our customers throughout the metropolitan Detroit area. A special feature of this office is its modular design which will permit expansion as the com-

THE NEW office is a reinforced concrete, brick and glass structure with columns sheathed in pre-cast concrete supporting a dramatic, horizontal roof which is also faced with pre-cast concrete.

More than one-half of the building features floor-to-ceiling, bronze-tinted plate glass windows. The remaining portion is encased with brown-hued brick.

The interior is finished in

walnut, formica and natural metal.

BOTH THE building and the 57-car parking lot are appropriately landscaped. Access to the L-shaped site is provided from Grand River, Middlebelt and Tulane.

New features of the Grand River-Middlebelt office include two drive-in windows, a night depository and a safe deposit department for the storage of customers' important documents and other valuables.

Manager of the office is Kenneth Melcher. He first joined Detroit Bank & Trust in 1948 and has served as manager of the Grand River-Middlebelt office since August, 1963.

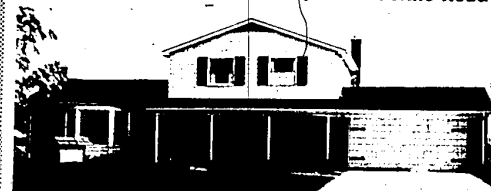

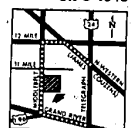
