

Falcons Wallop Walled Lake, Assured of Tie for 1st Place

The Farmington Falcon basketball team rocketed through the weekend, clinching at least a tie for the conference championship, and trouncing their cross-town rival, North Farmington High.

points. He was followed by Mike Wilson, an all-conference guard, and Junior Greg Dorow, each with 19 points.
But, the "hero of the game" award goes to star substitute George Ilabich.
Ilabich reached the pinnacle of his basketball career Friday night, as he scored the magical basket that gave the 100th point to Farmington. "Ilab" rebounded a missed shot with six seconds left in the game, and calmly banked a short jump shot off the backboard—giving him his seventh point in the fourth quarter.
After the wild, hectic finish,

Coch Quiggle stated, "This game showed me that we have a well balanced scoring team. We had four players in double figures, and they were all within five points of each other."
"We had rougher game against North," Quiggle said, "but Mike Ames (with 25 points) picked up the slack."
After a shaky first quarter, which ended with the Falcons a head, 11-10, Farmington bounced back and led by seven, 28-19, at the half's end.
Then in the fourth quarter with Farmington ahead 37-26, North staged a desperate comeback which brought them to

within four points of the leaders. But the Falcons, aided by four straight free throws by Mike Wilson, came back with eight points before North could score again.
"When Schultz fouled out (with 2:41 to go in the last quarter), North lost all of their points," Quiggle commented. "For the entire game, Rick Schultz, North Farmington's top scorer, was held to a meager eight points.
Coch Quiggle looks forward to Friday night's match with Pontiac Northern with an eye of optimism. "They don't have the team they had in past years," stated the former Michigan State All-American.
"The door is open, and we've got one foot inside."

Split in Play Raider Five on Weekend


North Farmington had a better than average weekend with a win against John Glenn, and a loss to Farmington.

On Saturday, it was a one-man show as George Grimala kept the Falcons in contention until the fourth quarter. "Gunner" Grimala seemingly could not miss as he connected on 11 of 13 shots for a total of 22 points by halftime, which saw the Falcons leading 34-27.
However, when Grimala lost the "eyes" in the second half, the Raiders from the North rallied. The Falcon defense faltered after Tom Wirtz fouled out, and the Raiders seized the lead and went on to win, 61-53.
Grimala was held to one bucket in the last 16 minutes of play, giving him a game total of 24 points. Tom Wirtz was the only other Falcon in double figures with 11.


Mackenzie Gets Award

Shake egg several times until the whites start to ooze out. Allow out the contents. If this does not work the first time, pierce egg again to break membrane and repeat process.
Supplies needed should include a hat pin, tooth picks, cuticle and regular scissors, and Elmer's glue. Suggested items include a card or braid or thin velvet ribbon to make hangers, rick rack, broken jewelry, jewelry stones, artificial flowers (miniature), pretty buttons, crushed glass, bugle beads, seed pearls, regular beads and sequins. For an egg with a scene in the center cut out an appropriate scene from a Christmas or greeting card leaving enough surrounding blank area for better determining size.
