"In a Little Spanish Town" was the theme used for Quaker Valley Farms Association's first annual dinner dance.

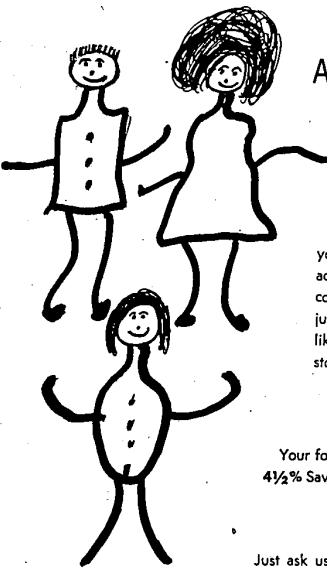
