TRONCED D. U. R. IN CLOSE GAME

Farmington Wins Game From
 the Railroaders. Good Game
 Expected this Week

The local ball tossers got back into the winning way last Saturday when they trounced the strong D. U. R. aggregation in a hard fought battle by the score of 9 to 7. The game was exciting throughout, both pitchers being thumped hard and often. Leakfelt, the fat southpaw of the visitors, being hit especially hard. Six two baggers, a home run and eight singles were garnered by the home crew while the city boys were taking a flounder and eight singles off from Johnson. Johnson's support, was air-tight, however, and he was helped out of several tough spots by brilliant fielding, especially around the second base, where Remington and Warner were clicking off double plays with a regularity and precision that was death to the hopes of the Detroit United contingent.

While Johnson was not as good as usual and allowed the Detroiters to take him for 7 runs, most of which were earned, his pals were assaulting the pill in a manner not to be denied, had the D. U. R. got more runs the locals were ready to match them.

In the first inning and the second Stoneburner and Wilber respectively poled the ball for two sacks apiece and while they didn't score it hinted at what might follow. In the third the deluge came, ushered in auspiciously by Remington, the first man up, who bunted the ball over Schroeder's house for a round trip around the bases. Harger and Stoneburner died, but Patterson walked, and doubles by Pierce and Maas gave Farmington three runs. These were duplicated in the next inning after the first two men had gone to their death. Remington drew four wide ones and Harger drove one over third for a base; Stoneburner came through with his second two bagger and Remington registered. Then "Hucks" Patterson cleaned the sacks with a corking drive to center, but was out himself when he overslid second base. Again in the fifth Farmington annexed a run on successive bingles by Pierce, Maas and Warner, and after going scoreless in the sixth the home savages sewed it up in the seventh on hits by Johnson, Harger and Stoneburner which netted two runs.

The game Saturday will be against the Standard Accident Insurance Co. team of Detroit. Go and see it. The crowd last week was almost double the week before. The gallery is half the game, so help and swell it.

SWAT ROOSTER SAYS HELME

State Food Commissioner's
 Remedy for Bad Eggs

Why does an egg rot? It is because it is a fertile egg. Eggs that are not do not rot. A hen can sit three weeks on infertile eggs and every one at the end of that time will appear like fresh eggs.

When we remember that only fertile eggs rot, the remedy for rotten eggs is simple. Produce none but infertile eggs during the hot months. This can be easily accomplished by removing the roosters from the flock. After the middle of June the hatching season is past. The old rooster is of no further use in the flock. Then is the time to swat the old rooster. It is an economic waste to feed him further. He will bring a higher price than at any other time. Make chicken pie of him or sell him to the summer resorter. Any who swat him. The little chicks will produce roosters for the next hatching season. Moreover the hen will produce more eggs with out the rooster than with and infertile eggs will not rot.

 the Standard School
