The program has grown from 10 classes and 190 students in 1993 to 30 classes and 700 students during the winter term just completed, but

we would like to see more growth. Almost everyone should be able to devote an hour or two a week for self-improvement or recreation. Having atended a class, we can personally vouch for the pleasant experiences awaiting those who have not yet enrolled in one. Many of us think of classes in terms of compulsory education, but the adult education program is entirely different.

All of the students are in class because they want to be and the enthusiasm displayed by people from all walks as the stimulating in itself. Then, as we enter the class, we are further stimulated by finding out that we can still learn despite the old wives tale about teaching an old dog new tricks. Add an instructor who is also enthused and we have all of the ingredients for a pleasant experience.
