

Farmington Attorney Wins Supreme Court Decision

A case of major importance in the field of labor management relations was decided by the United States Supreme Court on Monday, February 21. The decision of the Court in the case of Linn v. United Plant Guard Workers of America, established the principle that malicious and defamatory statements made during union or organizational campaigns are now subject to court suits for libel and slander. Earlier Court decisions held that personal damage suits were barred in labor matters except where actual physical violence was involved. Supreme Court Justice Clark said in the Court's Opinion:

"... malicious libel enjoys no Constitutional protection in any context. After all, the labor movement has grown up and must assume ordinary responsibilities. The malicious utterance of defamatory statements in any form cannot be condoned, and unions should adopt procedures calculated to prevent such abuses."

THE CASE WAS presented to the United States Supreme Court in a written brief and oral argument by attorney Donald P. Weldon, Jr. Mr. Weldon and his wife, Patricia, live at 2230 Manning in Farmington.

She was in the second class that was graduated from the Farmington High School in 1892 under the "new" graded system. She then taught at the Nichols School (Thirteen Mile and Farmington Road), and is still in contact with some of her pupils.

SUE MARRIED W. F. Zingelmann on her birthday in 1896, and they moved to Cleveland in 1901. They had three children, but the two oldest were burned to death in the tragic Collinwood School fire of 1908. They returned to Farmington in 1933 and lived on Collingham Street until Mr. Zingelmann's death in 1932. She now lives with her daughter-in-law on College Ave.

For about fifteen years Mr. and Mrs. Zingelmann were foster parents here of many children from the Children's Aid Society, the length of their stay varying from a few days to over fourteen years, and quite a few still visit to "see Grandma."
