

Livonia Police Chief Warns Drivers to Prepare for Winter

While it's still early in the cold season, yet it's late enough for local drivers to have anticipated several boxes with winter driving problems, and Livonia Police Chief James Jordan suggests that now is a good time for drivers to review recommended measures for handling seasonal driving difficulties.

"This information does not originate with me," the chief explained. "The source is the Committee on Winter Driving Hazards of the National Safety Council. And it is recommended by the International Association of Chiefs of Police that we help make safe winter driving information known in the interest of traffic control and accident prevention."

Accident prevention is not an insurmountable problem in rough winter weather, the chief maintains. The secret is to protect one's ability to see and to stop.

To cope with winter darkness and bad weather, drivers must get a head start on safety by keeping car lights in good order and windshield clearing equipment — wipers and defrosters — operating properly, Chief Jordan reasserted. And since seeing is a matter of looking, drivers should be doubly alert when natural visibility deteriorates.

The "stopping" part of the formula suggests the need for good, equalized brakes. In winter, of course, there is that other determining factor — traction. Stopping-traction drops dangerously on icy streets. This is when unprepared drivers can "lose their grip," the chief warns.

"Fortunately, we in Livonia aren't the only ones thinking about this problem," Chief Jordan said. "Winter driving research, conducted annually under auspices of the National Safety Council, has already given us much of the information on which a safe winter driving record can be built."

He listed these items of information:

On glare ice, braking distance may be as much as twelve times greater than that on dry pavements (something for pedestrians as well as drivers to remember). Averaging 195 feet (ten car lengths) with regular tires from a speed of only 20 mph. While more tires reduce this somewhat to 174 feet, reinforced tire chains further shorten it to less than half this distance—77 feet.

On loosely packed snow, average braking distance from a speed of 20 mph turned out to be 80 feet, while snow tires cut this average to 52 feet, and reinforced tire chains (with special warning chains) to 38 feet.

Underinflating tires does not improve traction so much as it reduces stability and engenders tire fatigue.

If the winter ahead still looks kind of long and dangerous to you, information like this may be just what you need, thinks Chief Jordan, who has this parting shot:

"With braking distances like our department take a dim view of speeders — especially those who speed in conditions aren't the best."

Annual Alien Report Drive Announced

Walter A. Sahli, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Detroit, advised Monday that the annual alien address report program is again under way.

According to Sahli, 131,000 aliens reported their addresses last year in the State of Michigan. The number this year is expected to be slightly smaller.

The Immigration official pointed out that the address reports are required by law and willful failure to comply with these requirements may lead to serious consequences.

Forms with which to make the reports are available at all Post Offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service offices. It is an easy matter to fill out one of the cards and return it to the same office.

Sahli added that trained personnel will be on hand in all offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to answer any questions the reporting aliens may have regarding immigration and naturalization matters. Sufficient trained personnel are not available to furnish this assistance in all Post Offices.
