Report from LANSING

After ignoring a comprehensive traffic safety program last year, the legislature now appears headed toward substantive action in this area.

Two factors have evidently convinced the majority party that immediate action is needed. First, the highway death and accident rate continues to increase. Total accidents for 1965 are projected as an 11.8 percent increase over 1964 and fatalities will be up 8.5 percent. 1965 saw well over 2,100 deaths on Michigan roads.

Second, a recent survey conducted by the Michigan State University Traffic Safety Center has shown that Michigan citizens feel that traffic safety and crime are the most important problems facing the state. The survey also showed substantial public support for

measures contained in last year's Republican traffic safety program, but blocked by the majority party.

Some of the reluctance to act on traffic safety bills last year was caused by an apparent lack of public support. The MSU survey has done much to lessen that concern.

Last week Governor Romney made his fourth special message plea for legislative approval of a massive attack on traffic safety problems. Finally, it appears as though his prodding will not go unheeded.

Traffic safety measures currently under consideration include:

- Increased funds and better supervision for public driver education.
- Driver education for all new drivers regardless of age.
- Periodic renewal examinations for driver licenses.
- Uniform driver licensing under the Department of State.
- Simplified consent legislation to control drunk driving.
- Stricter law enforcement and better central driver records.
- Annual inspection of motor vehicles.

No single element of any program is going to go far in reducing the slaughter on our highways. At the same time, however, a comprehensive attack on known accident factors will undoubtedly bring about substantial improvement.

Satisfying a short business goal is one of the greatest services this legislature can provide for all Michigan citizens.

Yet comments and ideas on this crucial issue will be welcomed.

The Conferences will be for land developers, economists, real estate brokers, businessmen and industrialists as well as for local public officials and members of local planning commissions.

Cavanaugh, who was recently re-elected mayor of Detroit, has been mentioned prominently in state Democratic circles in relation to his possible candidacy for the U.S. Senate in the event Senator Pat McCarran decides not to run for re-election.

Chairman Paul Livingston of the West Bloomfield Club and Aldo Vagnozzi of the Farmington Club said that they would extend a similar invitation at a later date to Assistant Secretary of State G. Mennen Williams, who has also been mentioned as a Senatorial candidate.
