SATURDAY'S GAME WAS A FARCE

Visitors Were Easy for the Locals. Good Game May be Expected This Week

Saturday the boys will hook up for the second time this season with the Burnham-Stoeple team of Detroit. Last time Farmington won 6 to 3 and this time we hope to do as well, although it is highly probable that the Puritans will be loaded in an effort to make Farmington bite the dust.

Valuable Colt Has Lockjaw

A valuable two year old colt owned by E. Erwin, the milkman of Farmington, has lockjaw. Dr. Cavell of Northville had the case but he turned it over to Parke, Davis & Co. of Detroit. This firm has been experimenting on such cases, but charge \$25 for each treatment. They finally agreed to doctor the horse and if they cured it the charges would be \$50 and if the colt died there would be no charges for the experiments. The colt cut its leg just above the hoot some time ago. The poison spread rapidly and stiffened the colt in all its joints, but as yet the jays have not set. The animal is doing nicely and is expected to recover.

Our streets are left uncleared since the early springtime, and all the places provided for tying horses is just one mass of manure and filth from which arises daily and nightly an unbearable stench. Talk about microbes, where is there a more prolific source than is here provided.

There are several places, which, although back of the business places, have not been looked after and properly cleaned, as well as all the other unsightly piles of rubbish and ashes, which are adding their quota to the very unhealthy conditions.

Our town hall has a very untidy and unclean source of handing out to the many strangers passing through our gates, and who are obliged to seek out what should be an accommodation, but instead is one most undesirable, rank with filth and rotteness.

Why not let the pride of those who should look after these conditions become aroused enough to at least clean up and so claim the reward of people in passing, to say what a beautiful clean little place they have here.

Grand River's Rapid Growth

The tremendous growth out Grand River avenue from Detroit still goes on and new subdivisions are being platted all along the line as far as Redford and beyond. This line is making more rapid advancement outside the city limits than any road, not even excepting Woodward avenue.
