## Jewell Chorale Heads Plym. Symphony Bill

Area music lovers will be treated to one of the season's most unusual programs Sunday at 4 p.m. in the Plymouth High School auditorium when the Jewell Chorale joins with the Plymouth Symphony orchestra in the presentation of "Belshazzar's Feast."

The 40-voice choir is returning to Plymouth for the second straight year and will be singing the difficult number for the first time in the area.

The concert is open to the public without charge and baby sitting service, furnished by Girl Scouts from Troop 253, is available.

Roger Jamieson will have one of the featured roles in "Belshazzar's Feast" as Bartolomeo.

Jewell is director of personnel at the Interlochen Arts Academy in addition to directing the Academy Choir. The Chorale is ranked as one of the most outstanding groups of its kind in the Midwest.

Sir William Walton composed "The Feast" in 1931 at the age of 29. It was written for an enlarged orchestra, two extra brass bands, organ, piano and chorus and uses the dramatic abridgement of biblical verses describing the fall of Babylon.

The concert will open with the "Overture and Allegro" by Copland-Milhaud by the orchestra under the direction of Conductor Wayne Dunlap. It will be followed by the "Unfinished Symphony" by Schubert.

## Atty. General Continues Probe

# No End Yet To PCHA Investigation

The investigation into activities of the Peoples Community Hospital Authority is still being continued and additional warrants may be issued if evidence of wrongdoing admissible in court is discovered according to staff members of Attorney General Frank J. Kelley.

Asst. Attorney General Patrick Foley said the investigation is by no means complete but that evidence admissible in court must be obtained before any criminal warrant is issued.

Foley was quick to point out action taken by Kelley was not meant to imply all 42 members of the board were equally guilty.

Foley said the Attorney General plans on recommending legislative amendments to a bill introduced by State Rep. Vincent Pettipiece (D-Wayne) designed to curb lobbying expenses of the PCHA. He urged city officials whose municipalities belong to the PCHA to recommend legislation to their state representatives and senators.

Asst. Attorney General Milton Firestone said the Peoples Community Hospital Authority is a good vehicle for providing services and operational areas of appropriations, bidding and communication needs to be improved.

The day after Firestone and Foley made their remarks at a Garden City meeting, Common Pleas Court Judge Julian P. Rodgers Jr. dismissed embezzlement charges against PCHA executive director Kenneth W. Gremore, former PCHA executive director. Rodgers ruled the prosecution failed to establish evidence of a relationship that Gremore was entrusted to handle funds for the Annapolis Hospital. Gremore was charged by the Annapolis medical staff by receiving a check to pay for

a dinner, depositing it in his personal account and spending it for other purposes. Robert C. Gossy, assistant attorney general, moved for dismissal of the embezzlement charge because he felt the offense was larceny by conversion instead.

Wayne County Civil Defense Director Henry K. Sletts has been granted a leave of absence by the County Board of Supervisors Civil Defense Committee.

Sletts returned from Florida and asked for the leave of absence after being issued with a warrant for spending PCHA funds for private purposes.

Sletts appeared at an arraignment, stood mute, and was released on bond to await an ex-

amination on March 14. In court action not directly related to Kelley's report, Circuit Judge George E. Bowles ordered the City of River Rouge to pay \$123,000 in back assessments to the PCHA.

After an attempt to withdraw from the PCHA in 1963, River Rouge quit paying its \$1 million assessment. River Rouge needs the two-thirds approval of the PCHA board of directors to

River Rouge City Attorney Roy Finn said the State Court of Appeals in 1963, River Rouge was asked to review Bowles' ruling.

At a meeting of communities represented in the PCHA held in Garden City, a number of suggestions were made to correct the present situation.

Finns and Dearborn Heights Mayor John Cantfield urged abolishment of the Authority and assumption of its assets by either the State Health Department or private enterprise.

Lincoln Park Mayor Ronald Stimpson asked the State Auditor General to conduct a post audit of PCHA books as authorized in Article IV, Section 53, of State Constitution.

Taylor Township Supervisor Alexander Papp, also PCHA director, asked for a reduction in the size of the 42-man board.

Stockwood Mayor Irvin Brewer, also PCHA director, said municipalities should keep better informed of PCHA activities by requiring a monthly report from their representatives,

Mayor Leo Paluch of Allen Park asked whether representatives to the PCHA could be elected by the people to encourage greater responsibility.

Cantfield and others spoke out against the practice of having members-at-large on the PCHA board of directors.

Romulus Supervisor Edmund Bieck and Huron Supervisor John Brandes said they would like to see the Authority dissolved.

The officials will meet again on March 4 in Dearborn Heights to recommend legislation for either better control over or abolishment of the PCHA.

Tomorrow night (Thursday) PCHA directors will hold a board meeting at Annapolis Hospital and will elect new of-

ficers for the coming year. PCHA Treasurer Frank Rodgers has resigned temporarily as Treasurer of Allen Park until charges against him for misuse of hospital funds have been resolved.

Kelley's probe resulted in charges of \$225,000 of PCHA funds being spent on travel, public relations, education, conventions and meetings over the past four years.

The probe also delved into an earlier attempt by Authority officers to transfer the PCHA assets to a private, non-profit corporation. Named in a civil suit for the corporation scheme besides Gremore are Gordon Gable, vice-chairman, Earl McNamara, chairman, and William C. Tullis, secretary.

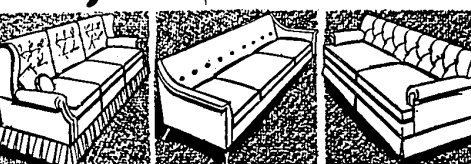
