

## Committee Hears Viewpoints

This suit has been stayed by Judge Clark J. Adams who ruled in effect, that he could not rule on the legality of a

legislative body's actions until that body acted. Wendell Brown, who is representing Braseth in the suit, has indicated that as soon as the Board of Supervisors acts he will go back to the court and request a ruling.

At the public hearing Brown restated his client's objections to the petitions and noted that Farmington Township Clerk Floyd A. Cairns, Attorney Joseph T. Brennan and Trustee Thomas Duke had all notified the petitioners. This he charged was in conflict with the law and represented a conflict of interest as all three of the people had a "personal interest" in the matter.

Tiley told the audience that this was a matter for the courts and that the function of the committee was to study the

question and to make a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors on whether or not an election should be held.

After polling the committee Tiley added that they wished more information from the corporation counsel as indicated that they would not act until consulting him.

Peggy Bye, a resident of the Village of Wood Creek Farms spoke against the incorporation pointing out that as a village being included in the proposed home rule city they would have no table in the matter. She pointed out that even if the Village voted unanimously against incorporation and the rest of the Township voted in favor of the question that the Village would be incorporated with the rest of the area.

Two women from the Village of Quakertown, Claire Orsola of 32388 Quaker Valley Rd. and Audrey H. Hagerson of 34441 Chantilly Court, also spoke against the move.

They asserted that the residents of Quakertown were not as solidly behind the motion as the Township officials would like people to believe and stated that there was much opposition to the matter in the Village.

Howard Weist, the staff secretary of the Township's Planning Commission and a long-time resident of the Township, told the committee that the move was right in line with the planning of the Township and that the petition carried many many signatures from the Village of Quakertown.

"The Village of Wood Creek Farms is frankly," he said, "wishes to go into Bloomfield Township."

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ship has increased from about 20,000 people in 1955 to some 41,400 people in 1965. During the same period, electrical use by Edison's residents, commercial and industrial customers rose from 38,583,000 kilowatt hours a year to 116,838,000 kilowatt hours, according to forecasts of the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission, the population is expected to reach 50,500 by 1970.

It is estimated that in five years the average residential customer in the city and township will be using 7,200 kilowatt hours of electric energy a year as compared to 6,331 kilowatt hours in 1965 and 4,338 kilowatt hours in 1955.

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a comparison of their operation under both a township and a city form of government.

It was the opinion of Charles Fritz, Norman Kreider and Nankervis, members of the subcommittee, that the home rule would not radically alter the performance of these services under the present township government.

For example, in its consideration of water and sewerage systems, the report said that "all levels of local government may contract with the Oakland County Department of Public Works for water and sewer trunk mains and thereby obtain credit of Oakland County to support the bonds while not obligating the township or city debt limitations."

On health, the subcommittee reported that both forms of government would enable Farmington to utilize the Oakland County Health Department and that a city may have its own health officials if desired.

Brennan was able to put in a plug for incorporation when the question of roads came up. He said that, in Oakland County, there are separate funds for cities and villages and one for counties, from which a township receives support for its roads and highways. "Cities and villages get considerably more per mile and per person than do counties," Brennan said.

Committee member Douglas MacArthur told The Observer that his committee, responsible for mailing out subcommittee reports to all township homes, has taken in \$48 dollars since the last meeting. "If we don't get enough to cover costs," he said, "I think we'll go into debt for it."

## 6 Year Plan

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from Farmington Rd. to the Expressway, \$27,600;  
• A total of \$24,000 is allocated for additional park development and improvement at a yearly amount of \$4,000;  
• An offstreet parking program for the north side of Grand River to the east City limits financed by a special assessment program with an estimated cost of \$32,500;  
• Open Space Development, \$20,000;  
• Local street improvement, \$50,000;  
• \$5,000 for street tree planting;  
• An extension of Shiawassee to the Plaza Shopping Center at a \$25,000 estimated cost;  
• Sidewalk installation, \$12,000;  
• Street lights, \$10,500;

The total cost for all the proposals would be \$3,843,400.

Dinan pointed out that the Planning Commission had utilized the Joyce Community Attitude Survey in adding the activity building and an outdoor swimming pool. Both of these projects are in the long range planning and would not enter into the budget until 1968.

Dinan also noted that the schools were seeking a referendum for indoor swimming pools and an auditorium and said that in 1968 the Council could certainly take another look at this part of the proposal and evaluate in the light of the present circumstances.
