Report from LANSING

Reapportionment of country boards of supervisors has been completed and it is now the duty of the Michigan House of Representatives to act on the recommendations.

At issue is a bill, now on the floor, calling for districts to be apportioned on an equal population basis by a county apportionment commission consisting of the county clerk, treasurer and prosecuting attorney. The bill would direct the commission to establish at least five, but not more than 40, districts "as nearly of equal population as is practicable" by May 15, 1966. The exact number of supervisors for a particular county would be determined by that county's total population. Under the formula, Oakland County could have between 36 and 40 supervisors.

Complicating the issue is the constitutional provision which established the present apportionment, the prospect that the legislature may pass a county home bill which would deal with the question of apportionment on a constitutional basis; and a case now

The Michigan Supreme Court now has before it an appeal from a Kent County Circuit Court decision directing the legislature to reapportion counties on a population basis. Since an opinion is expected soon, many legislators including myself, are urging a delay on the current bill until the court speaks.

Should the court uphold the Kent decision, the legislature would then be forced to comply with a new system, be it the bill now before the legislature or some other approach.

Many amendments have been offered to the current bill. Controversy centers around how many supervisors there should be and what is an appropriate procedure for citizens not satisfied with a plan adopted by their county's apportionment commission. On the question of who should do the apportioning, I personally would prefer an apportionment commission composed of the county clerk and a probate and circuit court judge to be appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors.

By the time these issues are raised out the Court may well have shed some light on the whole question, but no one can even make this prediction with any great degree of certainty. One sure prediction is that regardless of the method used to bring it about, there are some drastic changes ahead for county government.

According to Farmington Township Police reports Paige was pulling out of the driveway at 21255 Middlebelt when he was struck by Clock's car which was traveling south. Police ticketed Paige for failure to yield the right of way.

Now's Time To Register For Baseball

All boys are to be registered in the junior baseball program, co-sponsored by the Livonia Recreation Department and the Junior Football League according to the rules set by the city of south of the C and O Railroad traversing the city.

The north and south areas are divided into districts with one registration site and date in each. Parents must register within their own district at the designated center.

Tuesday, March 15 at 8 p.m. registration will be held as follows:

District 3—At Harrison Elementary School (area within the C and O Railroad, Inkster, Meridian and Six Mile Roads).

District 6—at Hull Elementary School (area north of the C and O Railroad from Eckles to Meridian south of Five Mile from Eckles to Farmington Road; and south of Six Mile between Meridian and Farmington Roads).

District 7—at Lincoln Elementary School (area north of Five Mile to Eight Mile Road between Farmington and Haggerty Roads).

District 8—at Coolidge Elementary School (area north of Six Mile Road to Eight Mile Road between Inkster and Farmington Roads).

On Thursday, March 24, at 8 p.m., registrations will be held as follows:

District 1—at Wilson Elementary School (south of the C and O Railroad to Joy Road, between Inkster and Middlebelt Roads).

District 2—at Franklin High School (area south of the C and O Railroad to Joy Road between Middlebelt and Meridian Roads).

District 3—at Rosedale Elementary School (area south of the C and O Railroad to Joy Road, between Meridian and Farmington Roads).

District 4—at Johnson Elementary School (area south of the C and O Railroad to Joy Road between Farmington and West city limits).

At each registration location, a parents meeting will be held to discuss the program, a question and answer period which will be followed by registration. It is not necessary that the boys be present.

Boys eligible for this program are those who will be 9 years of age, on or before September 1, 1966; and those 10, 11, 12, 13 years old. Boys who will be 4 years of age, on or before September 1, 1966 are eligible.

Registration forms are being distributed through the courtesies of the Livonia and Clarenceville Boards of Education.

If, for any reason, information is not received prior to your registration date, call the Recreation Department, GA 1-2000. Forms will also be available during the registration period.

Boys! Now Is Time to Register

Registration for the North Farmington-Bloomfield Little League will be conducted from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. March 19 and 26 at the O. E. Dunckel Junior High School in Farmington Township. This is the only time that boys may register. Physical examinations will also be given at that time.

Boys eligible to play in the league are those living within the following boundaries: 11 Mile Rd. on the south; Pontiac Trail and Long Lake Rd. on the north; Inkster Rd. on the east; Haggerty Rd. from 11 Mile to 13 Mile and Drake Rd. from 13 Mile to Pontiac Trail on the west.

The age limit is eight to 16. In order to qualify a boy must be eight by Aug. 1, 1966. Birth certificates must be presented at the time of registration.

The only exceptions which will be allowed to the March 19 and 26 dates are those boys moving into the area after this time and Colt League players playing High School Varsity Baseball.
