On Tuesday night, March 15, the music industry held its version of the Academy Awards—a fête they call the "Grammy" awards. In case your interest tends to lean that way, here are some of the results:

Record of the Year: "A Taste of Honey" Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass.

Album of the Year: "September of My Years"—Frank Sinatra.

Song of the Year: "The Shadow of Your Smile" (also up for a possible academy award).

Best Female Performance: "My Name Is Barbra"—Barbra Streisand.

Best Male Vocal Performance: "It Was a Very Good Year"—Frank Sinatra.

Best New Artist: Tom Jones.

Best Country and Western Single: "King of the Road"—Roger Miller.

Nowhere in the voting do you find the name "Beatles" but they have little need to be concerned. They are about to receive their ninth straight "gold record" an award certifying one million or more sales for their latest release, "Nowhere Man."

Terry Knight, former WJBK and CKLW night disc jockey, is now entered in the dice derby. He has recorded and released an item called, "Mr. You're a Man Too Little." The results so far should be somewhat encouraging to Terry. Although you haven't heard of the Detroit at which it (whether is another story altogether) the song has gone to the number one position on the hit charts in places where it is getting air exposure.

Remember Bill Sheenan? Sure—he was the popular morning newsmen with WJR for so long. More recently, Bill has been the London correspondent with the ABC network news team. Last week he was named to the post of ABC TV news director, replacing the late Jesse Zoumer, who perished in the March 4 crash of an airliner near Tokyo airport.

And just in case you're anxiously awaiting TEXT file's new TV series, here is a tentative list of titles for new shows which will debut at that time. The list is subject of course to change at whim of network executives. Stronger. No information as to the type of show is available at this time although many of the titles are self-explanatory.

D. Thomas Play Planned at Institute

Combining poetic fireworks and music-hall humor, "Under Milk Wood" by Dylan Thomas will be presented at March 23 through 25 by The Detroit Institute of Arts' Court Theatre. The Court Players will bring to life this moving and hilarious account of a spring day in a small Welsh town, beginning with dreams and ghosts before dawn, moving through the brilliant, noisy day of the town people and closing as "the rain of dusk brings on the bawdy night."

Dylan Thomas called it "a play for voices" and the entire acting company of the Court Players will be heard: Gail Billo, David Darlow, Tom Darrell, Michael Donofrio, Arthur S. Inman, Patricia King, Martin Molson, Dennis Pateila, William Patent, Roseanne Sepiak, Annette Winkler and Will Young. All are Detroit-area residents and have appeared in previous Court Theatre productions.

"Under Milk Wood" was commissioned by the BIC, but had its first performances in New York, a series of try-outs in "concert" form with Thomas directing and reading several parts. Enthusiastic audiences agreed with the critics who called it "probably the richest and certainly the earliest theatre experience of the season."

This is the fourth presentation of the Court Theatre, produced by the Theatre Arts Dept. of The Detroit Institute of Arts and directed by Clyde M. Vinson. Performances will be at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday, March 23-25. Tickets are available by mail or in person from the Institute of Arts Ticket Office (832-7300); also from all L. Hudson Ticket Services.
