Farmington's Mayor Sandy Brotherton has proclaimed May 7 as Student Work Day in the City. Township officials have also proclaimed the day in the Township.

Although cooperating in the project the proceeds will be used for different purposes by the students.

North Farmington, which raised \$726.27 last year, will use the funds to provide scholarship assistance for any type of post high school training. Last year they awarded two such grants.

A civilian hospital in Viet Nam will be aided with the money raised by Farmington High Students.

Each school is booking its jobs individually. At North Farmington the number to call is either 626-2511 or 626-4612. Farmington High School is scheduling chores at GR 4-6155 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

North Farmington has organized a three prong approach to the project.

- They conduct a day long car wash at the school at the flat rate of \$1 per car. (Last year a woman pulled out her garden hoe and did some gardening around the school shrubs while waiting for her car to be washed.)
- They provide a standby work force at the school to fill in on the spot jobs.
- They also provide work teams in the various subdivisions.

Both school work forces plan to meet at North Farmington at 5 p.m. to discuss the project and do some socializing.
