Job Interviews Could Be Made Much Easier

ANN ARBOR—If every employee could check his personal problems in the classroom, we could dispense with many of our business managers, a psychiatrist conjectures in a newly-issued University of Michigan publication.

Dr. Leonard E. Himler says that because a man cannot be expected to be a manager, it is important for the business manager to become an effective interviewer and counselor.

Writing in the current Management of Personnel Quarterly, published by the Bureau of Industrial Relations, a unit of the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration, Dr. Himler says that "Try as he will, the individual cannot prevent his relationships at home from influencing his job."

Furthermore, he adds, much of a manager's time, whether he realizes it or not, is spent in getting people to work together efficiently in spite of personal problems, attitudes, and mo- tives which they bring with them.

Dr. Himler, chief of staff at Mercywood Hospital, Ann Arbor, and an associate professor of mental health at the U-M School of Public Health, estimates that a business executive spends an average of 60 to 70 per cent of his time in direct consultation with people—many of these contacts of a type which should be called interviews.

Whether the consultation is for a new job applicant or for any aspect of a job already being done by an employee, there are five main steps to the skillful interview, according to Dr. Himler, who cites:

(1) Putting the interviewee at ease. "This in itself should not be difficult. One of the quickest ways to put a person at ease is to ask him to sit down. No one is comfortable for long while standing up, and anger and irritation are more quickly aroused in that position."

(2) Install confidence in the person being interviewed. "Psychiatrists and psychologists use the word 'rapport' which refers to a mutual feeling of friendliness and sympathetic unity. That is, the aim is to have the interviewer and interviewee share a feeling that they are working together on a common problem, even if they initially disagree on some points."

(3) Minimize irrelevant conversation. "It may be necessary to give some information... but interviews are designed primarily to gain information and to permit the other fellow to do the talking."

(4) Offer insight. "The in-

terviewer should be encouraged to view the problem a little differently than he did before. As a result he comes to a new conclusion about the thing that's bothering him. This may be a request for promotion, transfer, increase in salary, or any of the hundred daily problems which, if not properly handled, accumulate and undermine efficiency and cooperation. This involves much more than just giving advice."

To kick off their 10th Anniversary the Association is holding its Presidential Ball on

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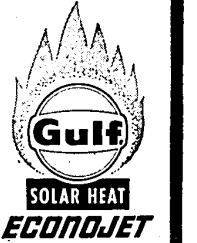

NOTICE OF LAST DAY OF REGISTRATION OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SOUTH REDFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT COUNTY OF WAYNE, MICHIGAN FOR THE ANNUAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON MONDAY, JUNE 13, 1966

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT: PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Annual School Election will be held in said School District on Monday, June 13, 1966. Act 269, Public Acts of Michigan, 1955, as amended, provides in part as follows:

"The inspectors of election at any annual or special election shall not receive the vote of any person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which he resides..."

THE LAST DAY on which persons may register with the appropriate city or township clerk of the city or township in which they reside to vote at said annual school election is Monday, May 16, 1966. Persons registering after 5:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on said Monday, May 16, 1966 will not be eligible to vote at said annual school election.

Under the provisions of Act 269, Public Acts of Michigan, 1955, as amended, registrations will not be taken by school officials, and only persons who have registered as general electors with the appropriate city or township clerk of the city or township in which they reside are registered school electors. Persons planning to register with the township clerk may do so at the following place and on the days and hours indicated below:

DAYS AND HOURS: Each week day between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., except on Wednesdays, on which day registrations will be accepted between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time.

LAST DAY OF REGISTRATION: Monday, May 16, 1966, but not after 5:00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time on said date.
