AAUW Presents Fellowship

The Farmington Branch American Association of University Women, has received the 1965-66 report of the Fellowship Chairman, Mrs. Robert S. Simanek.

Total amount from the sale of used books at the 13th Annual Booksale, held last autumn, was \$1,383.68. For the last five years, the Branch has donated 10 percent of the total amount to the Farmington Public Library, which, under the leadership of Librarian Mildred Drogge, co-operates in collecting books for the sale all through the preceding year.

The Library is also given first choice of these incoming books which helps to add new books to its shelves. This year the check presented to the Library by the Branch was for \$138.34.

To the AAUW Educational Fellowships Fund, 1965-66, the Branch has donated a total of \$1,383.68, which includes two \$500 named gifts in honor of Mary Deland, the other in honor of Ethel Bamber Gibson. In addition, \$245.12 was given as designated funds. All the money was assigned for current use in International Fellowships, and will be used to bring gifted women scholars from other countries to the United States for summer study.

Since the official (1966) membership for the Branch this year is 112, the per capita amount contributed to the Fellowships Program is \$11.11. This places the Farmington Branch at the head of the list of 63 Michigan AAUW Branches in per capita amount contributed. The Farmington Branch AAUW would like to thank the community for its fine support of the booksale.

Books are now being collected for next autumn. They may be left at the Library or picked up at the booksale. Chairman of the sale is Mrs. Richard Frankel, with Mrs. David Skinner as co-chairman.

Judge Beer To Orate

The Honorable William J. Beer, Oakland County Circuit Judge, will deliver the Fourth of July oration at the holiday of fun, festivities, feasting and fireworks to be held in Kendallwood 1 subdivision, it was announced last week.

Registration Day Set for Swimming
