Garden City Presbyterian To Dedicate New Addition

Garden City Presbyterian Church, founded 128 years ago in this community where the area was known as the Irish Settlement, will dedicate her \$150,000 addition and remodeled sanctuary, next Sunday, June 5 in services held at 4 p.m.

The Garden City Presbyterian Church has been around for a lot of changes. Founded as the East Nankin Presbyterian Church, buildings Nos. 1 and 2 served a pioneer and rural community. In 1928 the site was moved one mile west to present location and building No. 3 was built. Additions were previously added to building No. 3 in 1943 and 1955.

The church has served a very sparse population when organized with 15 members. Now, she serves a metropolitan area with more than 40,000 plus population of Garden City.

Taking part in the Dedication Ceremonies will be Dr. John Visser of the Westminster Presbyterian Church of Detroit, who will preach the sermon; Mayor Edwin J. Frey, mayor of Garden City; Ruling Elder George Cobb, moderator of the Presbyterian of Detroit; and Dr. Robert Vollen, executive secretary of the Synod of Michigan of the Presbyterian Church; and the Pastor, Rev. R. R. Rives, who has served as pastor of the Garden City Presbyterian Church for 28 years of the Church's long history. All three choirs of the church will sing during the Dedication service. Teachers and Pupils will be showing off the new educational facilities in an open house following the service, at which time refreshments will be served.

The public is invited.

A pulpit committee was organized immediately and its first job was to find an interim pastor. This was accomplished by securing the services of Rev. Edward Williamson Jr. Since most interim ministers do not take on any administrative work in the churches they serve, the duties must be taken over by the members. Fortunately, the executive boards were functioning already and only needed to re-evaluate their program somewhat to fill the gap.

Services continue on Sunday morning under the leadership of Rev. Williamson. A few changes were made during the worship hour which the interim pastor felt would help the members to accept and adjust to the transition that will inevitably come with a full time minister.

Rev. Williamson is director of radio and television for the Metropolitan Council of Churches, and supervises broadcasting for the nation's fourth largest metropolitan area, a coverage of nearly 10 million persons.

He was graduated from Richmond University with a B.S. in physics, and Colgate Rochester Divinity School with a B.A. in ecumenical theology. He has done graduate work and field work in the churches he ministered to at Delaware Baptist Church.

Rev. Williamson Jr. lives with his wife Angie and daughter in a bungalow. They are members of the First Baptist Church of Birmingham.

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Lutheran Church Holds 50 Years Anniversary

The Lutheran Church of the Epiphany is approaching the highlight of its year-long 50th Anniversary Celebration. As a part of the Celebration, the church has set aside the first Sunday in each month of the entire year of 1966 as an Anniversary Sunday. Sunday, June 5, will be for the reunion of former members.

There are approximately 2,000 former members, and approximately 1,000 have been invited to join in the reunion. As addresses are known, the rest will be contacted by telephone or telegram, if necessary. All of the former members are being invited to return to the church on this Sunday to attend the regular 11:15 a.m. service and then afterward join in a social hour to renew acquaintances.

The speaker at this service will be the Dr. E. T. Bernhart, who has been a pastor of the church since August, 1950, or 46 of its 50 years. It was under his guidance that the church grew from a little bungalow located at Bryson and Bauman to its present site and location on Seven Mile near Woodward.

There are now 2,500 baptized members in the congregation. Of the 2,000 former members, many left because of rejection in other parts of the state or country. A great many of the former members left the church to form the nucleus of mission congregations in the surrounding area. Many of these congregations have now grown to the same size or larger than the mother church. The Epiphany building which houses the present congregation was sponsored by the late General W. S. Knudsen, former president of General Motors.

Although the June 5th service is the highlight of the entire Celebration, the Anniversary Celebration will continue through the year with the Anniversary Sundays being dedicated to various activities or groups such as the choir, the daughter congregations or the young people.

With the first 50 years passed in such a wonderful manner, the congregation is ready to embark upon its second 50 years with equal vigor.
