School Officials Learn About Federal Programs

Twelve school board members and administrators from the Garden City, Wayne Community and Nardin Mills School Districts "went to school" in Washington recently to learn about new developments in federal government aids to local districts.

They were among the 52 school officials who attended the one-day conference sponsored by Congressman William D. Ford, Democrat, whose 15th district includes Westland and Garden City.

Attending from the Garden City district were Superintendent Edwin O'Leary, school board member John O'Pary and Gerald Swick, and special administrative assistant Robert Duhan.

The Wayne district was represented by Board Members Thomas Barrett and Robert Reichard, and Coordinator of Federal Funds William Taylor.

From Nardin Mills were Superintendent J. Harlan Hudgins, and board members David Goetz, Benjamin Jordan, G. F. Mulcrone, and assistant superintendent William B. Camfield.

Congressman Ford said the program was designed to "keep the local officials abreast of new developments in the varied federal programs which offer financial aid to local school districts."

The officials were addressed by Harold Howe, II, U.S. Commissioner of Education; Dr. Samuel Halperin, deputy assistant secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare; Arthur Harris, associate commissioner of elementary and secondary education; and Stanley Salicrú, director of education for the Community Action Program, office of Economic Opportunity.

During a luncheon program, the group heard talks by Congressman James O'Hara, from Macomb County; Dr. Lynn Bartlett, former Michigan Superintendent of Public Instruction who is now assistant secretary of Defense in charge of education; and Dr. Ralph Sief, special services assistant at Eastern Michigan University.

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Garden City Reservist On Duty

Former Garden City Mayor Charles E. Lowe, an attorney with offices in Southfield, will conclude this week a two-week Army Reserve Training Program. He is with Garrison 5004 in Camp McCoy, Wisconsin.

Lowe, 999 Cardwell, is a Lieutenant Colonel in the Army Reserve and is a staff judge advocate with his unit.

His duties include advising the post commander; rendering legal advice to Army personnel and dependents; and advising for court martials when necessary.

The attorney has a record of 23 years in the reserves and active duty with four years in World War II, of which 22 months were in the Pacific Theater.

Tierney Tops Opposition on Seaway Hike

State Rep. James Tierney, whose district includes Garden City and part of Westland, will lead a Michigan delegation Thursday to oppose a planned 30 per cent rate rise in St. Lawrence Seaway tolls.

Tierney, a former Garden City mayor and now chairman of the House Economic Development Committee, will fly to Chicago for a public hearing scheduled on August 2.

The Representative said that the Michigan Legislature has gone on record as opposing the toll increase which would affect overseas markets for Michigan steel companies and farmers.

Purpose of the toll hike, Tierney pointed out, is to amortize the \$50,000,000 capital costs of constructing the seaway. At present, the rates cover only the cost of operating the seaway. A plan to charge for the capital costs when the seaway opens was suspended to allow the system "to get going," Tierney said.

The legislator said that all of the concerned Chambers of Commerce are opposed to the toll increase and some even want to drop the current rates.

The seaway affects the entire Great Lakes region, Tierney said, and they are all expected to be represented Thursday's hearing. To accompany Tierney will be representatives of the attorney general's office, Detroit Harbor Terminals, Great Lakes Detroit Board of Commerce, and Michigan growers.

Tierney's comments at the hearing will cover the official stand of the state legislature.

Science Project Among Top Five in Michigan

A Garden City West High School student, Hallett Hall, is one of five Michigan students selected as regional winners in the 1965-66 Ford-Future Scientists of America awards competition.

The pupil's project is entitled "The Hyperbolic Concept of Space." The science teacher is Daniel Kretzenski.

The Ford program had 720 students in senior and junior high schools compete for plaques and certificates, with 2,500 receiving honorable mention certificates from the National Science Teachers Association.

The company sponsors the program which is conducted by the teachers' group to encourage students in secondary schools to undertake research projects in physical or life sciences and mathematics.

Insurance Bids Are Tabled

Garden City's Council tabled action on workmen's compensation insurance bids at a special meeting recently after confusion developed on one of the seven bidders' proposals.

The issue, which had the council refer the issue to City Attorney Ronald Mack for study and recommendation, saw six of the seven bids withdrawn the same range with the exception of Employers Insurance of Wausau, with offices in Detroit. Their base bid was \$13,467.44, while the others were at \$16,564.25.

However, it was not clear whether the insurance agent meant his bid to be a gross bid, after which discount and dividends are taken off, or a net bid, which would place them more than \$2,000 under the others.

An insurance agent seated in the audience said the insurance company would not have to stick by the bid although the City Council "could stick" to the agent's bid.

As the rates are set on a state-wide basis, the agents vary their bids on the basis of their own discounts and dividends.

Clerk-Treasurer Neal Nicholson recommended that the bid of the McFarlane-King Agency, 28220 Ford Road, Garden City, be approved by the City Council. The agency's set bid was \$11,737.61.
