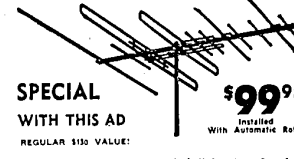

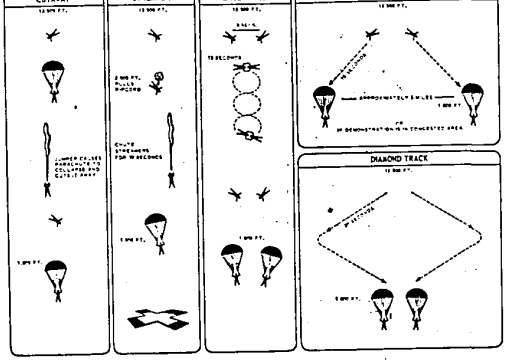

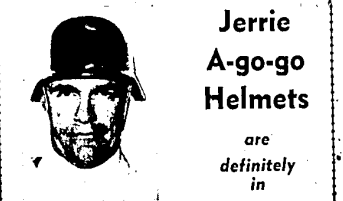
## Scouts to Show Skills Saturday at Wonderland Exposition

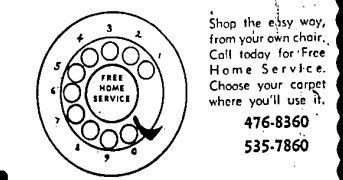
