Mayor's Son Gets Ph.D. At Harvard

A trip to Europe and a year's study at the medical school in Toulouse, France, led ahead for James C. Houk, Jr., who received his Ph.D. in Physiology from Harvard College on Thursday, June 16.

Houk is the son of Plymouth Mayor and Mrs. James Houk of 1200 Maple St. The degree was conferred in ceremonies in Cambridge, Mass. Houk was graduated from the Michigan College of Mining and Technology in 1961 with a B.S. degree. He received his M.S. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1963.

His Ph.D. thesis was written on the subject, "Sensory Transduction of Muscle Forces by Golgi Tendon Organs: Experiments and Models."

During the summer months, Houk and his wife will visit her relatives in Italy. They will also tour Greece before he begins a one-year research fellowship at Toulouse.

The couple will leave June 29.

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Area Students Receive Degrees at EMU Program

Eastern Michigan University honored 923 students at the institution's 131th annual June Commencement June 11 on the campus in Ypsilanti.

David Dodge Henry, president of the University of Illinois, delivered the commencement address and was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree.

Others receiving degrees included: Alexander Anthony Matsas, Greek ambassador to the United States; William A. Paton, professor emeritus of accounting and economics at the University of Michigan; and Woodard C. Smith, vice president of public services at Central Michigan.

A doctor of music degrees was awarded to Misha Mischakoff, concertmaster of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Of the 923 graduates participating in the commencement 683 received bachelor's degrees, 201 were awarded master's degrees, and 14 earned specialists in arts degrees. There was a total of 255 elementary and 228 secondary provisions teaching certificates awarded. Of this total 23 elementary and 21 secondary certificates were presented to candidates who did not earn degrees.

Industrial technician certificates were awarded to five students and seven two-year business technicians were certified.
