## KILLED BY A CAR

Man Named Wagner Drove in Front of Interurban at St. Mary's

A man named Wagner, living in Greenfield, was struck by a west bound D. U. R. car at St. Mary's last Saturday afternoon and so badly injured that he died within a very short time.

He was a plasterer and drove on to the track with a lime box on his wagon and only a few feet in front of the car which was then going at a good rate of speed. Owing to the trees it was thought that Wagner did not see the approaching car until he was on the track and too late to turn back.

The car was immediately stopped and the victim picked up and placed on a city bound car, but died about five minutes thereafter.

Owing to delay in the arrival of the ambulance to meet the car the body was taken off at the Grand River police station, where it was later removed to the city morgue.
