CRIMINAL TRICK PLAYED OUT

English Judges Place Little Confidence in "Confessions" Designed to Free Convicted Man.

The Law Journal of London in an article on false confessions says there is probably no ground of appeal from conviction which meets so little sympathy at the hands of the court of criminal appeal as that based on the confession of some one else that he and not the prisoner is the guilty person. An appellant, Selby, had been convicted of larceny and sentenced to three years in prison, in addition to which he was convicted as a habitual criminal and ordered to undergo five years preventive detention. He insisted that four witnesses against him were mistaken as to his identity, and after his conviction one Mitchell, also in prison, confessed that he committed the crime. Selby called Mitchell in his behalf on appeal, but there was no resemblance between him and Mitchell and the court refused to believe that all the trial witnesses could have made a mistake as to the guilty man's identity. In refusing to interfere with the conviction Justice Bray said: "This is not the first time that this game has been played, and it has, in fact, become not altogether uncommon."

HIGHEST BUILDING.

The highest inland building on the American continent is the new Chamber of Commerce building at Cincinnati says the Popular Mechanics Magazine. The tower portion of this building consists of 38 stories, four of which are below street level. The total height from sub-basement floor to top of tower is 636 feet, while the height above street level is 498 feet. The tower is surmounted by a lantern 14 feet high, the top of which is therefore 509 feet above street level. The building contains 6,175,000 cubic feet of space and 216,000 square feet of rentable area. The cost of the building alone is \$2,800,000, while the total investment, including the lot, is over \$3,000,000. The Chamber of Commerce will occupy the second and third floors.
