Among the 350 artists who will be exhibiting are: Margaret Craig of 35139 Florence, Westland; Caroline L. Dunlap of 29621 Lori, Livonia; and Joel J. Durand, 9123 Leno, Livonia.

Sponsored by the South University Businessmen's Association, The Ann Arbor Art Association, The Chamber of Commerce, and The University of Michigan, the fair draws the finest artists and craftsmen in the State. Artists from 10 other states will also contribute their talents to the four day affair.

Colorful Japanese paper fish fly over the booths stretched along a three block section of South University and East University Avenues which are closed to traffic during its duration. Browsing hours are 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the closing Saturday.

Demonstrations will be given throughout the fair in glassblowing, wheel-thrown pots, stichery, serigraphs, painting, jewelry, wedding, lettering, theater, and many other art forms.

Wally Roberts UP' GOING CURTAIN

Sharpshooting, leather-lunged Ethel Merman has planted her two feet firmly on the Fisher Theater stage and taken aim at a four-week attendance record in Irving Berlin's "Annie Get Your Gun."

Ethel is doing what comes naturally to her singing as the number "Old Fashioned Wedding" heard in the second act. Merman and Yarnell did five encores of the number on opening night stopping the show cold. "Wedding" replaces the last significant tunes in the original "Annie."

"Annie Get Your Gun" is the same sumptuous production that graced the stage at the Lincoln Center in New York. Detroit is indeed fortunate it is on the touring schedule for these superb musical classics as produced by Richard Rodgers. Only Philadelphia and Washington will be accorded the same pleasure as Detroit.

Merman's magnetic personality tends to dominate the show. However, the dancers, singers and other supporting players keep things top Ethel which results in a truly great show. "Doing What Comes Naturally," "Moonshine Lullaby," "You Can't Get A Man With A Gun," "The Girl That I Married," and "I've Got The Sun In The Morning" are loaded with melody and you whistle them once again as you drive home with a big smile upon your serene face.

Certainly Ethel is not so sedate, mature for the role. You'll note that old Wally was polite and did not mention the ugly word "old." Ethel never really gets old. She may put a few pounds on, have a little less spring in her step, but she will never grow old gracefully. Not Ethel, she is the perennial juvenile especially when that baby pink spot hits her and the conductor gives her a downbeat.

Hope you get down to see Merman. Her tour with "Annie" is only the second time she has ever gone on the road. She has always been strictly a Broadway attraction. You'll be lucky if you can get a ticket for her Fisher Theater stay since the engagement is practically sold out.

The Livonia Summer Musical Theater's lively production of "South Pacific" is facing a similar sold-out dilemma. First-week, reserved seat ticket sales already indicate that Friday and Saturday tickets have all but vanished. Contact Fran Klein, High (GA 5-1900) for ticket information. Better yet stop in and pick out your reserved seat ticket. The box office is open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Joy Road and Merriman location.

"South Pacific" holds the record of being the third longest running hit ever produced on Broadway. It has now close to five years. Can you name the other two? One had something to do with a lady most fair and the other sang poems of praise for a state in our southward.

Take the whole family over to spend an enchanted evening in the air-conditioned Franklin High to see this world-famous musical comedy. "South Pacific" opens on Tuesday, July 26 for a five-night run with a special Saturday matinee on July 30.

Dew Line

I guess it was inevitable... After all of our talk about the British "pirate" radio stations, operating off the coast of England, now comes the word that some enterprising Americans are about to attempt the same type of operation. Would you believe off the coast of New York?

Of course there are some inherent difficulties in undertaking such a venture here in the States. For one thing, commercial radio did not exist in England before the pirates started their commercial contents before the English ears. Here we take for granted that we can have our choice of programming—all commercially oriented.

Another attraction which made the British Buccaneers an attraction was the heavy emphasis on popular or "top forty" music, a thing that is so common here that it often has dial twisters searching for outlets of relief.

Yet, despite these differences, two ex-New Yorkers go merrily on their way with pirate program plans. They happen to be Charlie Greene and Brian Stone and until this venture they had amused themselves by earning their daily bread through the production of rock records. They have even purchased an old ocean liner which they found floating in the Hawaiian surf.

The operation is far from a sure thing yet, though. There are several technicalities to be overcome before the sound of the ship travels the waves into New York. There is a little matter of an international rule which says that all vessels must carry the flag of some nation.

The Green-E-Stone ship would thus come under the American banner and Greene and Stone's operation would thus be subject to such American institutions as the FCC. That means that license applications and volumes of proposals must first be submitted and approved by the commission and the FCC is known for its speed which often rivals that of the proverbial snail.

In any case, if plans go through, it should be interesting to see if the gimmick of an off-shore big beat blast can indent the fickle following of the two big radio rockers in New York—WABC and WMCA. Anyone for launching a pirate ship somewhere in the Detroit River?

Speaking of WMCA. Gary Stevens who exited WKRR for the New York station is working on his own part in the pirate radio race. He is negotiating with Radio England, a new American-owned ship station based for Britain. If an agreement is made, he will be doing a daily one-hour show for the off-shore station which he will tape in New York, playing the hits and happenings of the New York music scene for the London listeners.

Look for Les Crane to be back on the TV screen scene soon. He has been picked as the host-interrogator of a proposed daytime NBC show called "Inside Hollywood." The show, if it is chosen to be aired in the fall, would be an half-hour of behind-the-scenes, in-depth interviews with top Hollywood headlines. Emphasis would be on the controversial rather than the candid cliches usually present in such discussions.

Also on the "possible" slate at NBC is a Pat Boone half-hour variety show and a world-travel series called "Let's Get Away"—which is exactly what we'll do until next week.
