Elsa Reports Record Sales For 6 Months

Staunton M. Elsa reports record first half real estate sales, for the Elsa Realty Co.

Total sales for the first half of 1966 were, \$14,051,470.00. Up 17 per cent over the same period last year, when \$11,955,918.00 in sales were made.

Sales for the month of June were below June of last year, as the real estate market began to show the effects of the government's tight money policy. June 1966 sales for the Elsa firm totaled \$2,017,600.00 as compared with June 1965 when \$2,578,636.00 worth of residential, commercial and industrial real estate was sold.

Home sales are being slowed up by the tightened mortgage money situation, particularly to buyers with small down payments or marginal credit.

Strike Halts Sewer Work In Township

The strike of underground workers in the Metropolitan Detroit area has had a definite effect on five projects in Plymouth Township, according to Supervisor John McEwen.

McEwen said the strike has halted three Township jobs and two private projects.

Work has stopped on the storm drain on Sheldon Road, the sewer on Northville Road near the Thunderbird Inn and on the extension of the water mains to St. John's Seminary.

The strike also has temporarily ended work on the underground for the Heritage apartments, Sheldon at North Territorial, and on the Dettore Trailer Park in the Ridge Road area.

Detroit Bank to Show Graphic Arts Exhibit

Fifty Years of Graphic Arts in America... an exhibition collected by the American Institute of Graphic Arts to celebrate its 50th anniversary—will be shown in the banking lobby of the main office of Detroit Bank & Trust Aug. 2 through Aug. 25.
