Athletes' Physicals Scheduled
Physical examination for all boys planning to participate in any athletics in the Farmington School System during the coming year, has been scheduled for Aug. 25 and 26 at the two high schools.
Farmington High school will be the location of Aug. 25, while on Aug. 26 the facility will be moved to North Farmington High. These are the only dates for the examinations.
High school athletes are to report to their respective high schools at 9 a.m. and junior high athletes are to be at the school in their area at 10 a.m.
Examinations for Little League football players will be given at 11 a.m.
Jack Cotton, director of physical education for the Farmington Schools, emphasized that all boys who wish to participate in any athletics must take the physical examinations. Sports Participation, Medical Record Forms, which were provided earlier, must be filled out, signed by the parents and presented at examination time. No examinations will be given unless these forms are completed, Cotton said.
Arrangements for examination forms for Little League players should be made through the Little League organization.
Those who moved into the district recently and do not have forms, and those who have misplaced them, may pick them up before the expiration date at the school they will be attending.
Cotton said that the examinations are being given in cooperation with local medical doctors. A nominal cost of \$1 per boy will be charged.

Peace Corps Nurse Gains Experience
The desire to travel and to do something "different" ended up as a "broadening experience" for 23-year-old Nancy Niles of Farmington.
She has just returned from a 21-month tour of duty in the Peace Corps in Tanzania, East Africa.
Nancy recalls that she was in nursing training at St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor and the peace corps tests were being administered at the University of Michigan.
"I took the test," she says, "with a wait and see attitude about what would happen. Then the approval came through and I was off. It was a gradual process rather than a definite point in time decision."
The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John L. Niles of 28275 Farmington Rd., Farmington Township, Nancy served as a nursing supervisor in a 136-bed hospital in the country.
While there she and the other volunteers rotated among the various wards so as to gain exposure to each division of the hospital.
She found nursing a little different than she had in training. "The nurse is much more on her own," she explains, "and decisions that are normally made by a doctor in this country are made by the nurses in Tanzania."
The most common diseases she encountered were typhoid fever, smallpox, malaria, and malnutrition in children. A vaccination campaign to eliminate smallpox is underway, but hampered by lack of drugs and funds.
By the end of this fall there will be approximately 500 Peace Corps volunteers in the country. Nurses, lawyers, engineers, architects, nutrition experts, teachers, surveyors—the entire gamut of professional and technical personnel which go into the makeup of today's society are included.
Industry is coming to the country slowly, but the primary emphasis is on agricul-

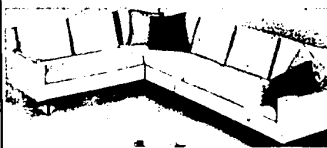
Cuba Schedule Picnic
