The bride was given in marriage by her brother, Keith Alford. She wore a knee-length white, pseudo-sole gown with a waist length jacket of alencon lace. Her

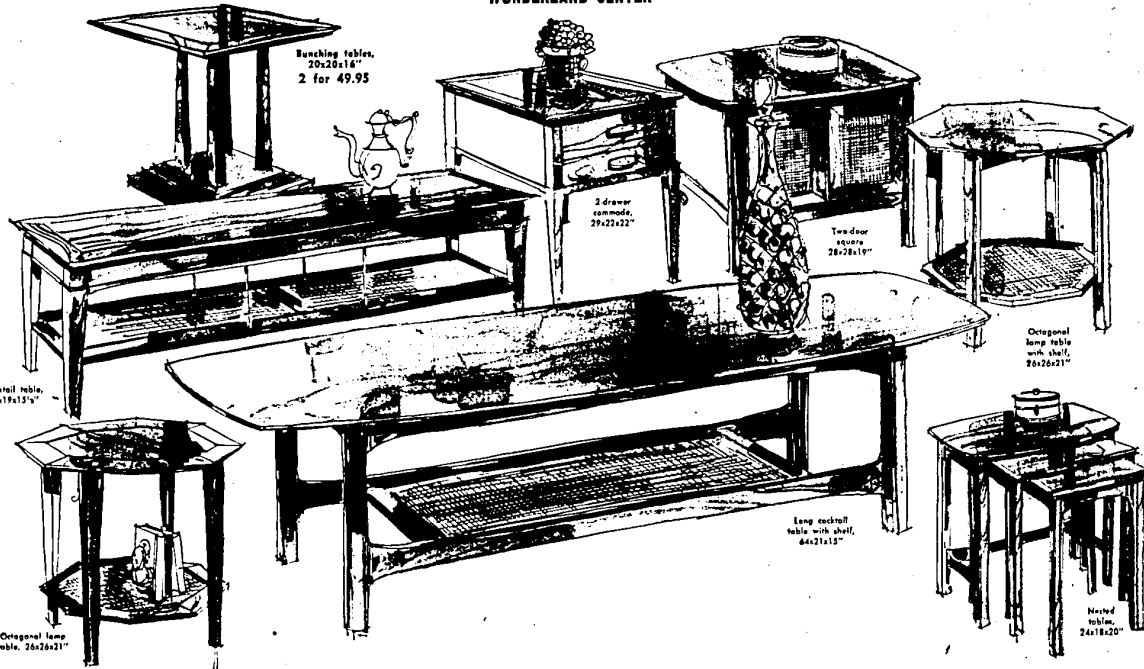
Post Anchors Easy

Posts for a shade roof or arbor to be built over a paved patio are most successfully mounted in a post anchor. That device bolts to the patio paving. Then ends of the posts are set into a stirrup-like seat and nailed through holes in the anchor's two sides. The anchor holds posts safely out of contact with damp paving.
