

Junior Footballers Play Good Openers

Rocket fans were rewarded Saturday afternoon when the Varsity and Banquets won their opening games against the East Detroit Mid-Jet teams on the Senior High School field.

The Varsity worked the bomb on their opponents when after they received the kick-off on the first play from scrimmage Tom Kempf threw a pass to Jim Aitken who covered 42 yards for a touchdown. Jim Aitken continued his fine play catching another pass that covered 27 yards and another touchdown in the first half.

The Rockets scored all their points by half-time when Greg Parmelee and Rick Colley added touchdowns on plunges from the line of scrimmage. John Dwyer added a touchdown on a fine long run that was called back because his team mates were penalized for a rule infraction. In the first quarter at East Detroit Mid-Jet, Linniger, broke away on an end sweep of 34 yards to score; and at half-time the Jets intercepted the ball and Ed Frankel and the tackling of Mike Devine, Jim Hartie, Jim Eveleth, Tim Grimes, Dan Felner, Rick Colley, Ed Wild and Ed Frankel scored—Rockets Varsity 26, East Detroit Mid-Jets 12.

Greg Adams scored a touchdown that was called back because of a penalty but had one other long run that resulted in a touchdown by Don Chapman. Defensively for three periods Mark Collier, Russ Blanzky, Kevin Renee, Tim Thayer, Tim Lawson and the eager Ben Hudson, kept the T-Birds between their 20 and 50 yard lines.

In the fourth quarter the subs let the T-Birds score two touchdowns while Head Coach Bill Renee was changing combinations of players and different positions. Craig Gow on a 22 yard reverse finally scored his first touchdown of the season which proves that even junior footballers can overcome adversity by perseverance.

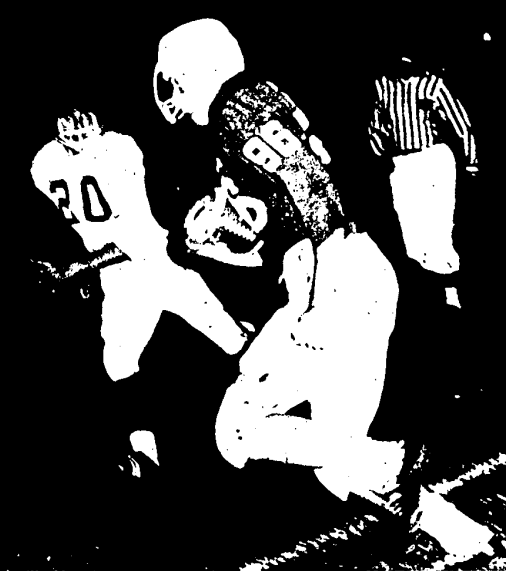

Razzle Dazzle, hipper dippier. Call it what you may, the use of "trick" formations as a major offensive weapon, coupled with an aroused defense, powered the Farmington Falcons to a 12-8 upset victory over Livonia Bentley.

The win over the highly touted Bulldogs made new coach Robert Mistle's debut a successful one.

Farmington struck quickly in the first quarter, blitzing through a bewildered Bentley defense to score in 36 seconds. In the opening series of plays, the Falcons scored the conventional "T" formation in favor of a wide open spread offense. Senior half-back Chris Norton capped the drive by sweeping left end for the final 10 yards. The extra point attempt was missed.

Raiders Razed By Grand Rapids

North Farmington's football squad returned home in the early daylight hours last Saturday morning after a 41-0 trouncing by Grand Rapids Central. Two bus breakdowns did nothing to help their spirits and had the parents at home chewing their fingernails with concern.

Starting this season with a previous 11-game series of wins, the Raiders left the loss of their graduated players and the Central team had a lot more beef. Before the season started Coach Ron Holland mentioned that the defensive line needed more beef.

Central gained 425 rushing yards while NF was held to 108 yards on the ground and completed only two of 10 passes for 18 yards.

Twice, the Raiders threatened, but couldn't move into the end zone. They fumbled the ball in the first quarter on the Central 10 yard line and later on were stopped at the 15.

After missing the extra point (4 personal problem for FHS football squads), the half ended with Farmington leading 12-8.

On a big third-down play from the 17 yard line, the Irish were detected for pass interference at the two, and Sorrows had the ball first down and goal to go.

Dave Hickey cracked through left tackle for the touchdown, but the score was nullified due to a backfield in motion penalty. Three plays later, after a five yard walk-off, McGrath scored on a quarterback sneak. The clock showed 2:30 left in the first quarter.

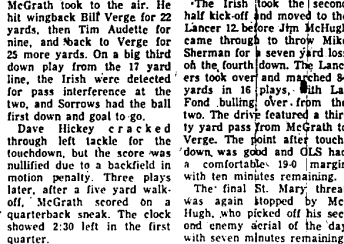
