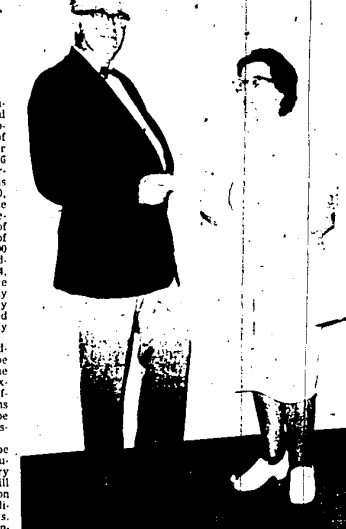
Musical Group To Open Season
