

Dem Candidates Promise High Priority To Safety

Democratic candidates for Farmington Township offices promised this week that, if elected, they would give top priority to improving the area's critical safety problems.

The candidates — Aldo Vagnozzi for Supervisor, Elizabeth Confer for Clerk, Joyce E. Hungerford for Treasurer, Harris Berger and Harold Shplee for Trustees, said a key proposal would be the creation of a citizens advisory committee on safety problems.

This committee would be made up of representatives of neighborhood associations and other interested individuals. The Democratic nominees also said they would make discussion of safety a permanent item of each Township board agenda.

"Despite the fact that the Farmington Township area is faced with a growing fatality and injury toll resulting from accidents very serious in this critical problem discussed at Township board meetings," a statement issued by the candidates points out.

The best of the Democratic safety program is as follows:

- Work toward lowering speed limits in all school zones as well as on highly traveled roads through residential areas.
- Special effort to ease traffic problems at subdivision entrances.
- Periodic surveys of traffic conditions to permit correction of newly developed traffic problems. (Results of these surveys should be issued immediately and not held off for months as was the case on 11 Mile Road.)
- Elimination of blinker lights at high accident crossings and their replacement with full stop and go lights on

Hall Rejects Dem Proposal

An invitation to Republican incumbents to take part in joint meetings before the November election has been issued by the Democratic candidates.

"I haven't received the invitation as yet," Curt Hall, Township Supervisor, remarked when asked about the bid, "and I doubt very much if it will be accepted."

"This is one of the oldest tricks in the business," he pointed out, "but I will pass the invitation along to the others—if they want to accept."

The proposal came from Aldo Vagnozzi, the Democratic candidate for Supervisor, and he suggested that the details for such meetings be worked out by a joint committee.

- Sunday: 8-9 a.m., Family swim with adult having to buy ticket, 3-4 p.m. and 4-5 p.m., Open swimming.


Girl Scout News

THE DESIGN was intended to be humanistic rather than monumental. Several small enclosed courts throughout the buildings gave intimacy from immensity.

Interior materials include American walnut, Thailand teakwood, and western hemlock. All three chapels have altars of Italian travertine marble. Chapel windows are antique, hand-blown glass from France and Italy.

THE SISTERS OF MERCY were founded in Dublin, Ireland, by Catherine McAuley in 1831. The Detroit Province, one of nine provinces of the Union of the Religious Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, branched from the Cincinnati Province in 1940. It takes in Michigan, Indiana, Iowa, and Argentina. Mother Carmelita Manning was the first Mother Provincial as well as founder of Mercy College of Detroit and Mt. Carmel Mercy Hospital.

Present Mother Provincial is Mother Mary Justine Sabourin, a native of Alpena and residing under the direction of the Farmington complex was designed and constructed.
