Fans must realize that the youngsters in the game are children and if they make an error or a bad play they feel worse than anyone. Make cheering positive.

Spectators must realize that the umpire is closest to the play and he calls them as he sees them. Remember in the majority of cases he is just a volunteer worker interested in young boys. They should learn the rules and regulations of the games so that they can fully enjoy Little League games. All should acquaint themselves with the philosophy of Little League to appreciate the purposes and aims of the program.

SPECTATORS WHO are critical of some phases of the program should either volunteer their services or talk with the proper authorities and officials and let them know their views.

As a spectator remember that what your boy does in the field performance wise, is no reflection on you. You should be distressed if the boy makes an error or plays poorly. However, it is also true that if the boy plays well the parent should not take credit although there is no doubt that there will be a feeling of great pride.

Spectators must realize that they are an integral part of the game and with their enthusiasm or apathy can add or detract from the spirit of the game.

39th Birthday For Shrine 44

Hildegard McCaleb, Worthy High Priestess of White Shrine, in announcing plans for the coming term in the newly renovated Farmington Masonic Temple recalled that in May the Shrine will be celebrating their 39th birthday.

Trinity Shrine No. 44 was instituted on May 28, 1927 in the Northville Masonic Temple. Flora Van Dyne was installed as Worthy High Priestess and James Van Dyne was installed as Watchman of the Shepherd. Minerva Parrott, P.S.W.H.P. and William Parrott, P.S.W.H.P., with the assistance of Trinity Shrine No. 2 initiated 39 members and installed the officers. The installing officers presented the Bible which is still placed upon the Shrine Altar today. On June 14, 1928 Trinity Shrine was constituted and presented their charter.

The Farmington Masonic Temple became the home of Trinity Shrine No. 44 in 1938 following several moves around Northville.

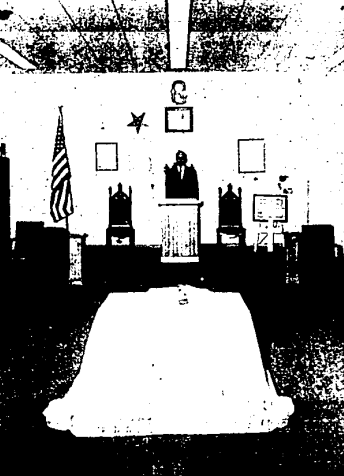
The work of Manning Seder, A.L.A., a new member of the fraternity, who stepped in to assist in the completion of the work has made the "Open House".

Farmington Masonic Lodge Dates Back To Early 1863

Organized Masonry in Farmington dates back to early 1863. On October 15, 1863, Most Worshipful Grand Master J. Eastman Johnson, granted a dispensation to the twelve charter members to open and conduct a Lodge at Farmington. Oliver B. Smith served as the first Worshipful Master.

The first meetings were held in the upper rooms of the dry goods store owned by Oliver B. Smith. The lodge met there from 1863 to 1872 when a fire destroyed the building and the Lodge lost its charter, records, furniture and all Masonic clothing.

THE FIRST MEETING after the fire was held on December 14, 1873, in a wooden building belonging to Past Master Norman Lee. The Lodge voted to build a new building on the corner of Grand River, east of Farmington Road. This building still stands today and at one time was the business place of Fred L. Cook a prominent member of Farmington Lodge for many years.

In the year 1875, the Village and Township of Farmington decided to build a Township Hall. The Lodge contacted the Township Board and made arrangements to part of the construction cost of the proposed new building for the purpose of using the upper story of the Township Hall. A contract agreement was reached and on October 28, 1876 the Lodge moved into their new home. The first meeting was a dedication ceremony held on December 27, 1876 conducted by Deputy Grand Master John Lewis. Since that dedication in 1876 the upper story of the Township Hall has been the home of Farmington Lodge.

In 1963, the Township municipal officers vacated the building and moved into the new Township Hall on Eleven Mile Road. The Lodge negotiated with the Township Board and City Council and purchased their interest in the building.

The Lodge then scraped their previous plans to build a new building at another location in the community and began an extensive program of remodeling and renovating of the old land mark.

THE MASONIC Temple has stood as a sentinel in the community holding within its walls many fond memories for the men and women who have made Farmington their home. The Town Hall is probably richer in Farmington tradition than any building standing today. This edifice, despite its age, remains its place as the center of the community.

VILLAGE OF QUAKERTOWN
HIDESTONE WOODS
ADDITION SEWER
ORDINANCE

An ordinance to acquire a certain sanitary sewer located in Biddestone Woods Addition Subdivision, to establish a sewer department and to provide for other matters related to the operation, maintenance and financing of said sanitary sewer.

THE VILLAGE OF QUAKERTOWN ORDAINS:

SECTION 1 - ACQUISITION OF SEWER
The Village Council and to provide for the payment of such other expenses as may become due and payable.

SECTION 2 - The Village shall be deemed annually to those persons using the system. Said bills shall show the amount and date due and if such bills are not paid within 30 days after said due date, a lien in the amount and date due shall be added thereto.

Charges for sewage disposal upon shall constitute a lien on the property served. On or before September 1 of each year the Village Sewer Department shall deliver to the Village Assessor a certified statement of all sewer charges then past due unpaid. The assessor shall then place such charges on the general tax role and the same shall be collected as a part of general Village taxes, or in the event that no Village taxes are levied in the particular year, such delinquent charges shall be billed separately by the Assessor.

The Village shall have the right to discontinue service to any premises when charges for sewage disposal service applicable to such premises remain unpaid in excess of six months.

SECTION 3 - The Village shall be deemed annually to those persons using the system. Said bills shall show the amount and date due and if such bills are not paid within 30 days after said due date, a lien in the amount and date due shall be added thereto.

Charges for sewage disposal upon shall constitute a lien on the property served. On or before September 1 of each year the Village Sewer Department shall deliver to the Village Assessor a certified statement of all sewer charges then past due unpaid. The assessor shall then place such charges on the general tax role and the same shall be collected as a part of general Village taxes, or in the event that no Village taxes are levied in the particular year, such delinquent charges shall be billed separately by the Assessor.

SECTION 4 - SEWER DEPARTMENT
There is hereby created the Department of Sewage Disposal of the Village of Quakertown, to be known as the Sewer Department, which department shall have full and complete jurisdiction and be responsible for the operation, maintenance, repair, billing and other similar functions necessary to the efficient operation of the sewerage disposal system herein acquired.

The Sewer Department shall be under the general supervision and control of a Sewer Commissioner and shall be composed of three members, one of whom shall be appointed by the Village Council. The Sewer Commissioner shall make all proper rules and regulations for the operation of the sanitary sewer disposal system. Such regulations shall be adopted by resolution of the Village Council and shall be filed with the Village Council. Such resolution shall be effective when ratified by the Village Council.

SECTION 5 - LIMITATION UPON USE
In accordance with the permit issued by the Oakland County Health Department and the Michigan State Health Department, the Village of Quakertown shall be provided by a S.D. Sanitary Sewer System shall be limited to Lots 18, 20, 21, 22, 24, 25 and 26 of Biddestone Woods Addition Subdivision.

SECTION 6 - LIABILITY OF THE VILLAGE
By the acceptance of this Sanitary Sewer System as provided in Section 1 of this ordinance the Village assumes the obligation to provide sewage disposal service to the properties indicated above by means of said system and assumes those obligations heretofore assumed by said lots and Edward Mosman and Anne G. Mosman, his wife, proprietors of said subdivision.

SECTION 7 - EFFECTIVE DATE
This ordinance shall become effective upon its publication in accordance with Chapter VI of the Charter of the Village of Quakertown.
