In Lodge, Farmington Road at Grand River Avenue, which is bordered by Oakland to the north and Grand River to the south and abuts the Masonic property on which the present monument rests.

Township Board members expressed a desire, in view of the approaching June 6 election at which time the incorporation of the township will come before the voters, for investigating the possibilities of locating a war memorial on land within their own boundaries. This step, it was pointed out, might serve the best interests of the "future city."

SUPERIOR HALL said it. "It might be considered history at this point starting to identify our own community in its own right. But we have four times the population (of the City) and more veterans living in the township."
