Persons who may be interested are invited to participate in discussion of the proposed change:

The following text change to the township zoning ordinance be considered during the public hearing as being recommended to the Township Board for its enactment as an ordinance amending the township zoning ordinance.

ORDINANCE 29-H

An ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 29 of the Township of Farmington, entitled:

"An Ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended, governing the unincorporated portions of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and for public and semi-public or other specified uses; and to regulate and other structures; to regulate and to determine the size of yards, courts and open spaces; to regulate and limit the density of population; and for said purposes to divide the Township into districts and establishing the boundaries thereof; and providing for the regulations, restrictions and boundaries of such districts; defining certain terms used herein; providing for enforcement; establishing a Board of Appeals and imposing penalties for the violation of this Ordinance."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan:

SECTION ONE:
That Section 1610 of Article XVI of said Ordinance No. 29, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

SECTION 1610 FEES - PETITION FOR AMENDMENT:
Upon presentation to the Township Zoning Board of Petition for Amendment of said Ordinance by owner of real estate affected, such Petition shall be accompanied by a deposit of the sum of One Hundred and Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars payable to the Township Treasurer of the Township of Farmington. Should the Township Zoning Board deny said Petition for amendment without holding a public hearing thereon, the Petitioner shall be entitled to a refund of the sum of Seventy-five (\$75.00) Dollars upon demand. Should a public hearing be held in connection with said Petition for Amendment no part of the \$150.00 deposit shall be returned.

All sums received under this Section shall be placed in the General Fund of the Township of Farmington to defray in part the expense of administering this Ordinance.

SECTION TWO:
All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION THREE:
The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon publication of the Ordinance in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

SECTION FOUR:
This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the day of 13— and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Tentative zoning text and zoning maps may be examined at the Farmington Township Hall, any day, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
