Marian Christie has had her parents visiting from Jackson this week.

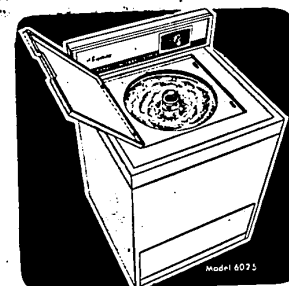
Tommy Franklin had his tenth birthday which he observed with his family.

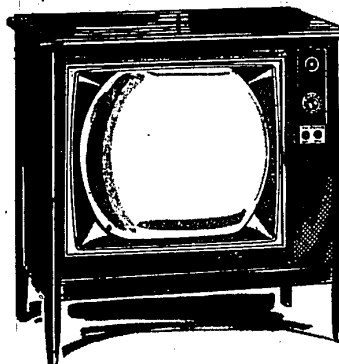

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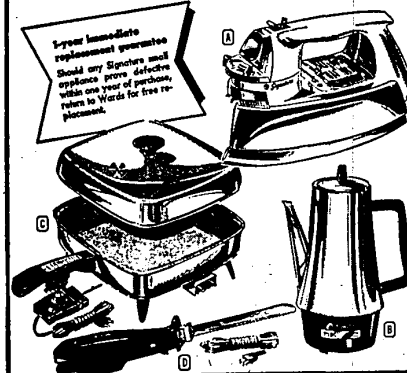
