

Falcon Thinclds Defeat Redford

Pole vaulter Ron Shortt flew to a new school record as he led the Falcon track team to an upset 57-32 victory over power Detroit Redford High, Monday night, April 25.

Shortt, sixth in the State meet last year as a junior, cleared the bar at 13' 9 1/2". He broke his own existing school record of 13' 8", set two weeks ago in Mansfield, Ohio.

Earlier in the season, Shortt placed second in the Spartan Relay held at Michigan State with a vault of 12' 6". He also placed second in the Mansfield Relays, a meet which brings in participants from a 400 mile radius in the Midwest.

Outstanding performances in the Detroit Redford meet were also given by Joe Watson, George Habicht, and Fritz Simmons.

Watson turned in a time of 11.4 in the quarter mile, finishing well ahead of every other contestant.

Joe ran very good in the quarter mile, said Douglas Race, head track coach at FHS. "I

think, by the time the state meet comes around, he'll be able to turn in a 50 second quarter." (Which would break still another school record.)

A TRIPLE EVENT winner for Farmington was Chris Brown who captured first place in the 100 yard dash and the broad jump.

Fritz Simmons equaled all expectations as he captured a first in the shot put with a toss of 44' 6", then went on to astonish everybody by taking another first — this one in the low hurdles.

Finally, George Habicht broke his own personal record as he went 5' 10" in the high jump — higher than any other Falcon has done this season, and good enough for another first place finish.

Saturday, Farmington participated in the Brother Rice Relays, and captured second place in the High Jump Relay, third in the Mile Relay and the Distance Medley, and fourth in the Shotput Relay.

Today the Falcon track team plays host to Waterford High, meeting starting at 4:00 on Clarence Bell Field.

Tennis Season Opens at FHS

On Losing Note

Dismally, the tennis season opened last week, and saw the Falcon "racketeers" drop two consecutive matches in the space of four days.

Friday, April 15, Farmington met with North Farmington on the Raiders' home ground, with disastrous results. The Falcons were literally swept off the court, and managed to salvage only two victories in the seven individual contests.

The lone victory against NF were Kurt Dembeck, playing the second singles position, and Terry Bacon, in the number four singles spot.

Then on April 18, the Falcons journeyed to Royal Oak Kimball, and were again dealt a crushing defeat. And again, Farmington only succeeded in winning two of the seven team matches.

Kurt Dembeck, a three year varsity veteran, secured a second straight victory as he downed the Kimball number two man, and Tom Ugrin, playing number four singles, supplied the only other Falcon win.

Tomorrow-afternoon, the FHS tennis team will meet Waterford High in the second Inter-Lakes Conference match of the season, at 4:00 on the Farmington courts.

Raiders Tennis Teams Rapped By Plymouth 'Rocks'

After a decisive win over Walled Lake, 6-1, the raiders netters were stunned by the "Rocks" of Plymouth, 2-3.

At Walled Lake, the Raiders demonstrated why they should be a power in conference play. Dick Streng (at first singles) over-powered his opponent 6-0, 6-1. In the number two slot, Mike Ortwin easily outclassed his enemy 6-2, 6-1. Bad luck hit the team when Bill Orr lost a close match 5-7, 4-6. At fourth spot Dan McCort powered his way to a 6-4, 6-3 victory in his debut as a singles player.

The doubles team seemed mild anxiety among Walled Lake opponents, for they had not lost yet this season. First doubles composed of Ken Phair and Dave McCall won their match rather easily.

Then the exchange team from Sweden stepped up and slaughtered their opponents 6-3, 6-1. Last of the doubles and the youngest, Gary Jones and Paul Kamp won an impressive match and made the sixth point for NF.

On Thursday of the same week, the NF team ran into stiff competition and lost a de-cisively close match to Plymouth. Again in the number one position, Dick Streng, hung on 7-5, 6-3 for a victory. The other point for the Raiders came from third doubles, Gary Jones and Paul Kamp who came from behind to win a three set marathon.

The rest of the team saw a nightmare of lost matches. First doubles Ken Phair and Dave McCall probably playing one of the top teams in the state from Plymouth and were soundly beaten by them. Bengt Hanson and Mats Alberts also lost their tough second match to their opponents. However, the singles put up more of a tussle before succumbing.
