Earns Marshall Scholarship For Study in England

Lynn Walker Hobbs of 54105 Hunters Row in Farmington is one of 24 American scholars who have been awarded Marshall Scholarships by the British Government to enable American students to study in British universities and take a degree.

The program was established in 1953 as an expression of British gratitude for Marshall Aid.

Lynn Walker Hobbs, who studied at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, will attend the British university, St. Edmunds Hall in Oxford and pursue the field of study in Metallurgy for a higher degree of the university.

THE VALUE OF THE Mar-

shall Scholarship is of the order of 800 pounds per annum (including fares to and from Britain, tuition fees, book allowance and a living allowance of 225 pounds per annum). In certain circumstances a marriage allowance is also payable.

The method of selection for the Marshall Scholarships is by short lists of recommended candidates which are drawn on by five regional committees, each composed of a British Consul-General for the region and four United States citizens. For the purposes of selection the U.S. is divided into five regions, the North Eastern Region, the Mid-Eastern Region, Southern Region, Mid-Western Region and

the Pacific Region. Four scholarships are awarded in each of the five regions.

HOBBS' SELECTION was made from candidates in the Mid-Western Region which includes the states of Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Minnesota.

The scholarship awards are made for two years in the first instance but may be extended for a third year. Candidates must be U.S. citizens who are under 28 years of age on October 1, 1967, and who are or who will then be, graduates of an accredited college or university in the U.S.

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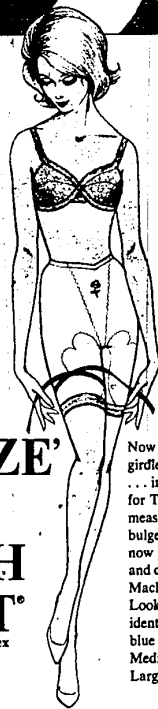
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
