The deadline for entries is Midnight June 5.

Professional chefs, cooks, Edison employees and members of their immediate families are not eligible.

JUDGES WILL select ten finalists from the most interesting and promising recipes. The talented ten will then compete in the cook-off for "King of the Patio" honors and other awards on Wednesday, June 15. All finalists must be available to compete in the cook-off.

Marion Ryan, electric living director, feels it's best not to depend on Mr. Weatherman for ideal conditions for an outdoor cook-off, so she and her staff will convert the Edison Sales Auditorium into an outdoor patio setting.

Miss Ryan and her staff will provide the groceries and cooking equipment for each finalist. There will be an assortment of electric broilers, ovens, rotisseries, and grills for the finalists to use.

Second prize will be a patio table complete with table set for eight and an electric rotisserie-broiler.

Third prize will be an open-hearth broiler-rotisserie complete with a shish kebab attachment.
