Family Gives Portrait To Isaac Bond School

Members of the Bond family presented a portrait of Isaac Bond for whom Farmington's oldest elementary school is named at a ceremony held at the school on April 25. Principal Weldon Petz accepted the

gift on behalf of the faculty. The portrait was painted by James Allen of Grosse Pte., a son-in-law of Isaac Bond. During his lifetime, Mr. Bond worked to see that rural children would have educational advantages. He served as a member of the school board for over forty years. He was convinced that rural school districts would have to consolidate into large districts which would have valuation to provide adequate school facilities. Finally the voters approved consolidation and the new district built the Isaac Bond School which originally was a five-room edifice for grades one through eight.

Mr. Bond was active in political affairs and served as township clerk, township supervisor, and Oakland County Road Commissioner. As a member of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, he was on the building committee which supervised the building of the Oakland County Tuberculosis Hospital, Oakland County jail and the infirmary.

He and Mrs. Bond moved to Orchard Lake Rd. when they were married in 1900 and lived there for over 50 years. Mrs. Bond, now 85 years of age, lives in Oakland Subdivision as does her son, Howard, an attorney, and her daughter, Mrs. Harlem Morris who teaches at Wooddale School.

Another daughter, Mrs. James Allen, lives in Grosse Pointe, and a son, Floyd, the only one of the children who attended Bond School, is now dean of the Business Administration School at the University of Michigan.

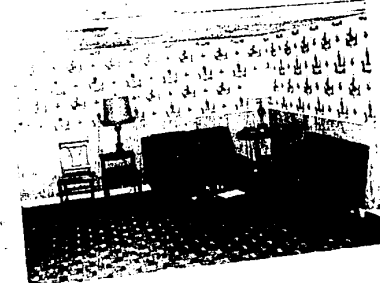
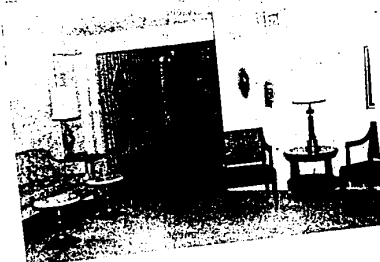
