Area Teachers Plan Language Workshop Here

Farmington's elementary teachers will explore many facets of teaching language arts at their annual spring day-long workshop May 13. Theme of the sessions is "Improving Communications." The keynote title will be followed through improved means of communicating in such areas as poetry, motor skills, choral reading, audio-visual aids, films and guidance, and music and rhythm.

Co-chairmen of the affair are elementary principals Doris Lachmann of Wooddale School and Ronald Jackson of Shawassee School. All elementary teachers and specialists will participate. There will be no classes May 13 for students.

THE MORNING workshop session will convene at 8:15 a.m. at East Junior High School. Following a general session presided over by Miss Minnie Zielke, director of elementary education, Superintendent Gerald V. Harrison will speak briefly on the district's participation in the Title I Federal Program. Sectional meetings in each language arts area will follow.
