Many patrons of the library seem to be unaware of the large selection of magazines in the lounge area. These magazines are for the public to use at the library and are also available for circulation - six magazines per card for one week.

For nature lovers there are many to choose from: American Forests, Audubon Magazine, Farm Journal, Field and Stream, Living Wilderness, National Parks Magazine, Outdoor Life and Sunset. For sports enthusiasts, the following are available: Flying, Hot Rod, Motor Boating, Motor Trend, Yachting, Sports Illustrated and Recreation.

For people with hobbies and interests, the magazines are American Artist, Antiques, Art News, Craft Horizons (which in their March-April 1966 issue make mention of the Michigan Art Institute Show at the Detroit Institute of Arts during March and particularly mention two Farmington residents and their works - a rug by weaver Clinton Mackenzie and a tall goblet by John Glick) Modern and Popular Photography, and U. S. Camera. Music lovers can browse through American Record Guide, High Fidelity, Opera News and Musical America. There are many selections for the science-minded of this age: Aviation Week and Space Technology, Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists, Missiles and Rockets, Popular Science Monthly, Science, Science Digest, Science News Letter, Scientific American and Sky and Telescope.

For the man in business, the choices are Business Week, Changing Times, Dun's Review and Modern Industry, Harvard Business Review, Monthly Labor Review, National Business, Forbes, Time and U. S. News and World Report.

More familiar magazines for the enjoyment of both men and women are Atlantic, Esquire, Good Housekeeping, Harper's, Holiday, Ladies Home Journal, Life, Look, McCall's, Mademoiselle, New Yorker, New York Times Magazine, Newsweek, Parents, Reader's Digest, Redbook and Saturday Evening Post.

**Eddy Article Is In Pageant**
