bid has not as yet done so.  
It was decided by the Board to receive the bid already submitted and turn them over to the Township committee for study and a report back at the next regular meeting, May 23.

Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan, Township Accountant Robert Clarke and Board Treasurer Harry Oppenheimer will meet with Clapton to review the several bids submitted on the proposed hospitalization insurance plan.

IN OTHER ACTION taken by the Board Monday night, it was decided to proceed with the special assessment district for a road improvement program on Rhonwood Street between Gill and Drake roads. The proposed improvement program will be financed jointly by the Oakland County Road Commission and the Township.

The total cost of the hard surfacing road improvement project is estimated at \$44,000, with participation in the cost from both the County and the School District property owners are expected to pay no more than \$1 per front foot. The financing plan, signed by at least 50 per cent of the property owners of record are necessary before the special assessment district can be established and the Township will send letters to the property owners informing them of the project costs. Public hearings will be staged when the necessary petitions are confirmed and accepted by the Township.

In other action taken Monday night, the Board authorized the purchase of transistor radio equipment for the Police Department at a unit cost of \$684. Maintenance costs and the use of patrol cars with radio breakdowns were cited as reasons for the purchase of the transistor models. The Township has purchased re-built radios in the past.

AN INTERESTING ordinance for the Township and their firm of consulting engineers, Fite, Hirm and Bogue, was approved by the Board Monday night with minor revisions. The new ordinance sets up rates to be charged developers for inspection service on Township construction projects.

## Police Close Golden Case

Farmington Township Police Chief Irving H. Yates this week announced the Golden armed robbery case was finally closed with the sentencing of two Detroit men in Oakland County Circuit Court.

Gast Dean, 22, of 400 North Campbell in Detroit was sentenced by Circuit Court Judge Frederick Ziem to three to 20 years on the armed robbery charges. Sentenced with Dean was Marshall Endriques, 25, no known address, for a term of from 4½ to 24 years on the same charge. They broke into the Golden home last Halloween, terrorized the family and fled with several thousand dollars in jewelry and cash.

RONALD PONEY, 24, of 135 Waverly in Detroit, another man arrested in the Golden case, is waiting sentencing in Detroit on an armed robbery charge. A fourth accomplice, Arthur Cardenas, 26, of 149 Portland in Highland Park, was sent back to prison some months ago for violation of his parole.

The past week Farmington Township Detectives arrested three Detroit men on charges of violating the Dangerous Weapons Act. The arrests followed several months of surveillance by Township Detectives and police from the Detroit Narcotics Bureau and State Police assisted in making the arrests. Some 2,000 Dexamyl pills were recovered by detectives and the subjects were turned over to Detroit Police for prosecution.

They had been operating in the Township area when first attracting the attention of police. BREAKING AT 27 two schools, North Farmington High and North Farmington Elementary, as well as Leo Adler Imports, 2801 Grand River Avenue, were robbed last week by the ship Police. ## Little League Parade May 14 To Open Season

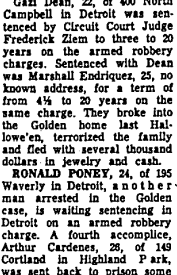

## Alexander Hamilton Breaks Ground in Twp.

This week marked two special occasions for the Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Company of America. Ground

was broken last Wednesday, May 4, in Farmington Township for a new home office of the Michigan company, on its second anniversary, according to E. Keith Owens, chairman of the board.

The new building will stand on a 13-acre tract in the Quakertown Office and Research Center facing the 1608 Expressway at 12 Mile and Farmington Road. The site of the new building will be a simple room for parking and support the proposal.

THE COST OF each pool would be approximately \$600. The building will be financed by the sale of qualified bonds which would not increase the present debt rate. However, payment of the bonds would be included in the general number of years. This means that future residents of the school district would also have to pay for the project.

Many areas surrounding Farmington are fortunate enough to have pools. There are pools in the Plymouth high school in Birmingham there are pools in the two high schools and in the four junior high schools. Livonia has a pool at the Stevenson High School. In Bloomfield, Rochester, and Northville, the respective school districts are either constructing a pool or pools, or are making plans to begin construction. Pools have been built on Detroit schools since 1920.

Clarencville, with a school district population of 13,500, about one half of Farmington's, has a pool at the Clarencville High School which is constantly in use. Their pool is open six nights a week, and is full to capacity most of the time. According to officials, their only problem is not enough pool capacity and not enough hours in the day. In 30 weeks, last year, the pool was open for a program taught 1,000 students now to swim.

ACCORDING TO Physical Education Director Colton, "pools would not only be beneficial from the standpoint of water safety, and community recreation, but also from the standpoint of additional physical education teaching stations in our schools, to handle the increase of students in the Farmington area. The school district is growing at a very rapid rate, approximately 1,250 children per year, and it is imperative that we have additional teaching stations just to keep up with future enrollment requirements."

THE POOLS WOULD be available for use by everyone. During the day and early afternoon there would be the regular school classes. Later in the afternoon such events as swimming team practice or precision team practice, or swimming club practice could be scheduled. The pools would be open until closing time the pools would be held for special instruction programs and for open swimming.

The Farmington Jaycees are supporting the proposal to build pools and auditoriums on the two existing high schools with plans to include the construction of a pool and an auditorium on the new high school to be built in the near future. The proposal will be voted on in the June 13 school election. The Jaycees are scheduling a series of fact finding articles to appear in the Farmington Enterprise concerning certain points of the proposal. This is the first of the series, the second article will appear next week and will feature auditorium.

term "subsidy" in the Enterprise story two weeks ago reporting on the Board ambulance service discussion. He said Superior feels the \$1,200 is "services rendered" and added "they feel they have something extra to sell."

Last year the Township paid Superior \$200 to cover the uncollectable bills. Increased maintenance and service costs were cited as reasons for the jump this year.

The Board was reluctant to approve the \$1,200 subsidy but felt a trial program, to run until May 31, 1967, was the only answer to providing adequate ambulance service for the Township. A complete check on the number of ambulance service calls and other data will be kept during the trial year.

continuing problem, E. Keith Owens, chairman of the Board, pointed out, although the company now occupies five buildings in Plymouth. Accelerated growth has necessitated plans for a central home office structure far ahead of original expectations.

The new building will place all home office facilities under one roof, while leaving the company's state and regional sales offices, with their more than 50 employees, in Plymouth.

THE IMMEDIATE NEED for expanded office facilities is indicative of the growth the company has experienced in its first two years. In 1965, the company wrote and placed in force more permanent ordinary life insurance than any other Michigan-based life firm. Licensed in Michigan May 5, 1966, it passed 1,100 other insurance companies by total permanent business in force, according to Owens.

When the company began to issue permanent life insurance, a goal of \$50 million a year was set as its objective, Owens said. The company reached this goal in its first six months of operation. Now at the end of two years, it has written more than \$200 million, with \$132,000 in new business as of the first quarter of 1966.

Last month the company began sales operations in the state of Indiana, and is licensed in eight other states, with applications pending in 21 additional states.
