Franklin Community Church Continues Bldg. Fund Drive

Members of Franklin Community Church, Franklin, last Sunday launched the second part of a four-year-long effort to build and pay for a new educational wing to the church and to start an organ fund. Pledges were made by members during Loyalty Sunday services. Called the Franklin Forward Crusade - Stage II, the campaign had its beginnings in the spring of 1964.

At that time members of the church pledged approximately half of the \$180,000 needed for construction of a new addition completed nine months later. The effort to get under way Sunday was for a second two-year period to pay off debt obligations. A committee also has been named to investigate various possibilities in an up-dated music program, including new organ and lighting.

Leading Sunday's services at 9:30 and 11 a.m. were the ministers, Dr. Harold E. Bremer and the Rev. Robert M. Stopper.

Members received a brochure this week in which financial requirements and goals were outlined. In Sunday's services they were asked to make their financial pledges. Personal calls were made Sunday afternoon on members not present for the services.

A Methodist Church, Franklin Community Church, celebrated its 125th anniversary last year. It is one of the oldest churches in the state.

Mental Health Is Study Topic At Southfield
Studies in mental and emotional health are being conducted Wednesday evening at 7:45 p.m. by Pastor Raymond Bayne of the Southfield Community Church, 21122 Indian (between Beech and Lahser, North of Eight Mile). Text of the course is Struggle for Peace by Dr. Henry Brandt, Christian psychologist and counselor. "Shall the following described territory in Oakland County, Michigan, be incorporated as a Home Rule City under the provisions of Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended:
WHEREAS, heretofore on November 8, 1965, pursuant to Act 279 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, a petition was filed by certain resident electors and freeholders of the area, praying for the incorporation of the territory described as:

Farmington Township, being described and known as "Town 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan", which Township is bounded on the north by Fourteen Mile Road on the East by Inkster Road, on the south by Eight Mile Road (also known as Baseline Road), and on the west by Haggerty Road, including the existing Villages of Quakertown and Wood Creek Farms but excluding therefrom that part of Farmington Township within the corporate limits of the City of Farmington, as a Home Rule City.

That the form and sufficiency of the petition heretofore filed on November 8, 1965, praying for the submission of the question of incorporation of the City to consist of the territory described in said petition, comply with the provisions of Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, and are in all respects regular;
That June 6, 1966, be set as the date for a Special Election on the question of incorporating the City.
