### Principal Of Woodale Accepts Gavel Of Office

Doris Lachmann, principal of Woodale Elementary School, is the newly elected president of Southern Oakland County Branch Association for Childhood Education with a membership of over 500 teachers and parents.

The Association was formed by the merging of two organizations of teachers each founded to promote better educational opportunities for young children. The International Kindergarten Union, organized in 1892, adopted a new constitution and the new name of Association for Childhood Education in 1930. The following year the National Council of Primary Education adopted the constitution

and name of the association. In 1946 it was amended to include the intermediate level. Today it extends beyond the United States borders and not only teachers but also all people interested in the education and welfare of children ages two to twelve are encouraged to belong.

The Association Headquarters, newly completed in 1960, are located in Washington, D.C. The association cooperates with other organizations and agencies such as The National Congress of Parents and Teachers, the White House Conference on Children and Youth, The Council on Cooperation on Teacher Education, etc.

During the past year the Association was called upon by President Johnson to take a leading role in providing information and help in the Project Headstart. Since children and what is best for them is the function of the organization, they were already prepared and had many answers and suggestions at their fingertips for the newly formed project.

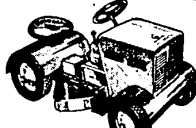

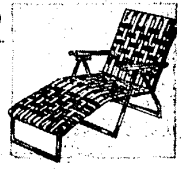

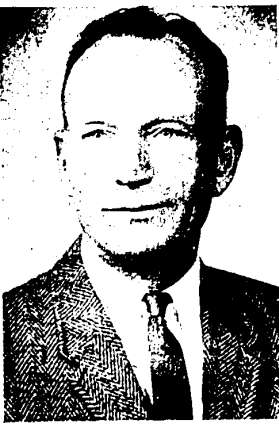
