## Cap and Gown Party Fun

After commencement exercises, comes the celebration — with friends and relatives gathered to honor the happy graduates. For the reception, large or small, I suggest a pretty buffet table set in simple elegance. Coffee service at one end, punch bowl at the other — with cups, plates, napkins and spoons nearby. And a convenient arrangement of foods, so guests can help themselves with ease. For the menu, dairy nut bread sandwiches (see my favorite recipe below) ... party minis and mixed nuts ... and a celebration cake made by you. Your graduate's favorite flavor, of course — decorated in alma mater colors. And don't forget the camera!

**NUT BREAD, CUM LAUDE**  
3 cups Bisquick  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/4 cups milk  
1/4 cups chopped nuts

Heat oven to 350°. Mix first four ingredients. Beat vigorously 30 seconds. Stir in nuts. Pour into well-greased loaf pan, 9x5x3 inches. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes, or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool before slicing.

**Little Leaves:** Prepare nut bread recipe except — divide bread among 4 well-greased miniature loaf pans, 4 1/2x2 1/2x1 1/2 inches. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes. For round loaves, divide balls among 5 well-greased soup cans. Bake at 350° for about 40 minutes.

For nut bread sandwiches, spread with cream cheese or lemon or orange butter. Mix 1 teaspoon grated orange or lemon peel with 1/4 cup soft butter. And at the punch bowl, stir it up grand!

**ALOHA PUNCH BOWL**  
1 can (1 pound 14 ounces) fruit cocktail, drained (reserve syrup)  
1 to 2 quarts ginger ale, chilled  
1 can (6 ounces) frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed  
1 can (1 pound 4 ounces) unsweetened pineapple juice

Arrange 7 or 8 cherry halves from fruit cocktail in ring mold that fits into punch bowl. Garnish with tiny pieces of greens. Add about 1/4 inch water; freeze. Add remaining fruit cocktail and just enough water to fill mold 3/4 full. Freeze. Unmold; place cherry side up in punch bowl. Four ginger ale, lemonade concentrate, pineapple juice and reserved syrup into bowl; stir. 12 to 15 servings.

Pretty as a picture now, this will be recorded for posterity in your photo album.
