Running non-stop in an endurance race held at the Pit Shop Model Car Raceway on Farmington Rd., a team of young drivers ran continuously for 13 hours, 12 minutes and 20 seconds, setting a new world record. The old record of 12 hours, 57 minutes was set a year ago out West.

The winning three-man team, Justin Fishman 13, Rick Hennessy 14, of Livonia and Keith Suda 15, of Bloomfield Hills was one of six teams entered in the Enduro.

The second place team, Harold Hovis, Matt Campbell, and Jim Wilkins, all from Farmington, dropped out with gear trouble after 10 hours, 28 minutes, and 45 seconds of hard driving. Although no information is available, it is felt that another record was set by Davey Burley, Kevin McCaffery and Doc Buttermore another Farmington team. The team dropped out after running only 26 minutes, 15 seconds with body mount trouble.

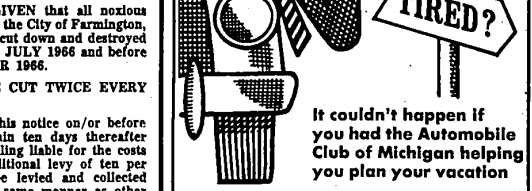
Violators will also be subject to a fine and court costs, Chapter I, Section 1.12.
